From Rabbi Mark Joel Mahler

Temple Members: Please read this and then pass it on to... Dear Unaffiliated,

First, please forgive the generic salutation. You and I both would prefer that this letter begin with your name. But I don't know your name, and I wish I did, which is precisely the reason why I'm writing to you.

Perhaps you've been to Temple Emanuel for a life cycle event, a bar or bat mitzvah, a wedding or a funeral. Perhaps you've only driven by us on Bower Hill Road, or perhaps never. Perhaps you were once a member of a synagogue somewhere, but no longer. Perhaps you've never been a member of a synagogue. Perhaps you or your parents identified culturally as Jews, but not communally with the Jewish people nor religiously with Judaism. Perhaps one of your parents was Jewish and the other not Jewish, so you were raised neither. Or perhaps you are Jewish and your life partner isn't, so you doubt if together you can be comfortable in a synagogue. Whatever your story is, I don't know it, but we at Temple Emanuel would love to know it.

To introduce ourselves to you, please take a look at our website, www.templeemanuelpgh.org. You'll see the many activities engaging our members. Our services and programs are designed to meet the various spiritual and social needs of our community. The website also offers thumbnail sketches of our lay leaders, our rabbis and professional staff, our teachers and students, our office staff and maintenance staff. Together we keep our congregation humming and our building beautiful.

Of course, a website is only a virtual door. To truly see and experience what we have to offer, you need to come to Temple! Whether at Shabbat services, an adult education program or on a Sunday morning during Torah Center, you'll see our members' broad diversity of ages, interests and life circumstances. You'll see circles of friendship. Ross Harrison is on the faculty of the Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University where he teaches courses in strategy. He is also a non-resident scholar at The Middle East Institute in Washington, and is also on the faculty of the political science department at the University of Pittsburgh, teaching courses in Middle East politics. He annually teaches a course on strategy and international security to senior Georgian government officials at the Georgian Foundation for Strategic and International Studies in Tbilisi, Georgia funded by the U.S. Department of State.

Harrison authored *Strategic Thinking in 3D: A Guide for National Security, Foreign policy and Business Professionals* (Potomac Books- 2013), which currently is a required strategy text at the U.S. National War College, as well as at many civilian universities. He has lectured on matters related to strategy and as well as Middle East politics at the U.S. Department of State, the National War College, National Defense University, The Navy War College, the U.S. Department of State's Foreign Service Institute, Georgetown University and the Matthew B. Ridgway Center for International Security Studies. He has been published in many policy related journals and has been quoted extensively in the New York Times on issues related to the Middle East. Harrison lives in Washington, D.C. with his wife Mahnaz.

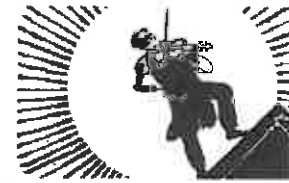

In the waning months of World War II, Lawrence Newman living in Brooklyn has many anti-Semitic neighbors. A milquetoast, Lawrence, a Presbyterian and WWI vet is unmarried. At work, he turns down the job application of Gertrude Hart, as he believes she is trying to hide being Jewish. He is not anti-Semitic per se, but does not have the backbone to stand up to anyone or any group that is. Regardless, he can't stop thinking about Gertrude. He soon understands her anger in not being hired as he begins to face discrimination because he looks Jewish. It isn't until he runs into Gertrude again and begins to spend time with her that he gets a clearer picture of the issue and what he needs to do as a start to live a happy life in a peaceful world free of discrimination, even if it is at an initial personal cost.

Richard A. Cohn & Charlotte Cohn Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship honors Richard A. & Charlotte Cohn, who touched the lives of many young people from all walks of life. The annual grant will be presented to one or more students whose accomplishments and character merit this award.

Scholarships shall be awarded at the Annual Meeting of Temple Emanuel of the South Hills, which will be held in June. The source of funds for the scholarships shall be the income derived from the Scholarship Fund. The scholarships will be given to one or more members of the Temple who are graduating high school seniors, and will be enrolled in a junior college, college or university the coming fall.

The criteria used to evaluate applicants for the scholarship shall include:

- Official academic record
- Extracurricular activities
- Confirmed
- Service to Temple and/or community
- Two essays **MUST BE TYPED**
- Two recommendations from a teacher and/or employer

The choice of the student(s) to be awarded the scholarship(s) shall be made by a five person selection committee, chosen as follows:

- The Cohn family's designee
- The Financial V.P. of the Temple
- A Torah Center instructor selected by Temple's President
- The Temple Educator
- One member of Temple at large as chosen by the President

Relatives of the donor or members of the selection committee shall not be eligible to receive an award. The committee shall make its selection on or before May 10 of each year and inform The Pittsburgh Foundation on or before May 20.

It is understood that the scholarship(s) shall be paid directly to the junior college, college or university which the student will attend in the forthcoming fall.

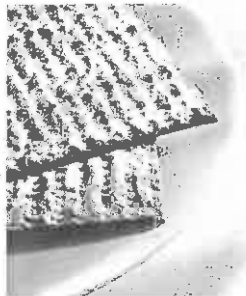
The committee need not award a scholarship in any given year if in its sole discretion determines that no applicant is deserving of an award.

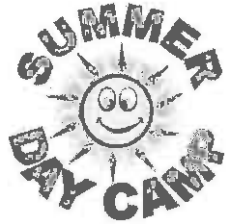

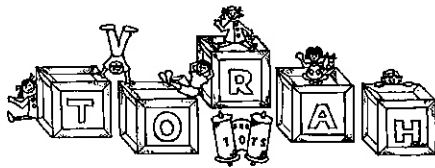

Volunteer To Help Homeless Families Training March 6 1:30 at BHCC

Family Promise of Southwestern Pennsylvania connects homeless children and their families with a network of local congregations and dedicated staff who provide shelter, meals, hospitality and support until they are able to return to sustainable independent lives in their own homes. Over 40% of the homeless population is made up of families. Many shelters do not accept entire families and they have few options.

You may remember this program as the Interfaith Hospitality Network. In the past, Temple Emanuel was a strong participant. This community based program has a Day Center in Crafton, PA which is their address of residence and base of operations for finding employment and permanent housing. Families have access to shower and laundry facilities as well as childcare at the center. A fulltime caseworker is also there to provide assistance. The average stay for a family is 48 days and roughly 70% of them successfully return to sustainable housing.

The evening shelter and meals are provided by a network of host congregations. Each host congregation is assigned up to five weeks a year. These host congregations are assisted by the support congregations. **Temple Emanuel is excited to support Bower Hill Community Church (BHCC) this year!**

Bower Hill Community Church just completed their first assigned week in February and we had a chance to observe. They are well organized and experienced with Family Promise. It will be a pleasure to partner with them.

BHCC is responsible for four more weeks during the year and Temple Emanuel has the following days: April 12, June 21, September 20 and December 27. We may wish to consider taking December 25 as a Mitzvah Day project.

The volunteer opportunities are:

- Afternoon Van Driver (4:30 pm – 6:00 pm),
- Dinner Hosts (5:00 pm – 7:00 pm),
- Evening Hosts (7:00 pm – 9:00 pm),
- Overnight Hosts (9:00 pm – 6:30 am), and
- Morning Van Driver (5:00 am – 7:00 am). The van is a fourteen passenger van.

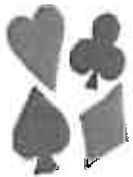

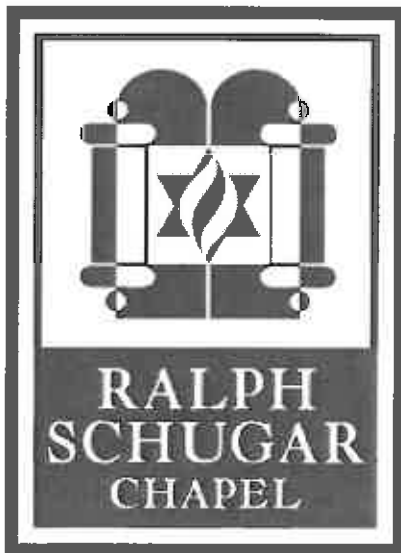
