It's back. The naked ambition, the accusations and obfuscations, the slash and burn tactics, and the merciless bloodletting. No, not the HBO series, but the new season of the USA version of Game of Thrones: the 2016 national election. Not the predatory gambits for the Iron Throne in Westeros, but the scorched earth politics to preside at the desk of the Oval Office in the White House.

For those who follow both versions, which makes you squirm more? For all the rest who are familiar with only the American version, you have the unfortunate winner.

Fiction always has the fallback that, after all, it's just fantasy. But the ongoing Un-Civil War between Democrats and Republicans is hard, cold reality. "Here ruining people is considered sport" is not from a script describing Westeros but from the suicide note penned by Vince Foster, President Clinton's deputy legal counsel, describing Washington. Rage now prevails as political currency. The worst debates enflame not inform, agitate and aggravate not inspire. Even at the debates' most genteel, watching two people argue for two hours is distressing.

Whether all this Strum und Drang settles down on November 9, the day after the national election, remains to be seen. But let's not get ahead of ourselves. We now face five months until then, five months sure to sharpen the rhetoric and churn the maelstrom. How then to avoid rancor, the cynicism and fear, all of which this Game of Thrones preys upon?

First, thank God for the late night media types and talents who offer a laugh as well as a rant. Thank God too for political satire websites such as The Onion that turns every candidate, even the scariest, into fodder for comedy.

But seriously, doesn't humor go only so far?

So thank God for the prayer book. Our Siddur abounds daily with prayers and meditations that speak directly to today's political conflict. Consider the following two among many.

"O Guardian of life and liberty, may our nation always merit Your protection. Teach us to give thanks for what we have by sharing it with those in need. Keep our eyes open to the wonders of creation, and alert to the care of the earth. May we never be lazy in the work of peace; may we honor those who have died in defense of our ideals. Grant our leaders wisdom and forbearance. May they govern with justice and compassion. Help us all to appreciate one another, and to respect the many ways we may serve You. May our homes be safe from affliction and strife, and our country be sound in body and spirit.

"Grant us peace, Your most precious gift, O Eternal Source of Peace, and give us the will to proclaim its message to all the people's of the earth. Bless our country that it may always be a stronghold of peace, its advocate among the nations. May contentment reign within its borders, health and happiness within our homes. Strengthen the bonds of friendship and fellowship among all the inhabitants of our world. Plant virtue in every soul, and may the love of Your Name hallow every home and every heart."

Next time America's bitter version of Game of Thrones gives you ajita, open the Siddur for relief.

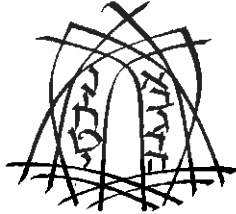

- Temple, indoors or out, depending on the weather on May 26.

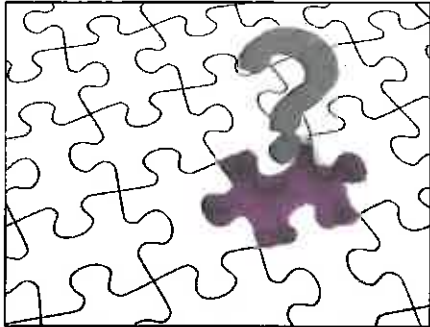

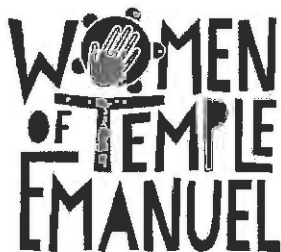

for SHIM



This year, Temple Emanuel joins eleven other organizations in supporting SHIM and their three pantries: Bower Hill Church, St. David's Episcopal Church, St. Joan of Arc, Hamilton Church, Kindercare Mt. Lebanon, Neil Armstrong Girl Scout Troop, John McMillan Presbyterian Church, an Eagle Scout project and St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

In 2007, SHIM planted a garden on site to support their food pantry. Their ambitious goal was to replace over 50% of the food with fresh produce. Last year over 11,000 lbs. of produce was collected from eight contributing gardens. Over 600 families were served and almost half of them were employed. Each school district in the area has seen an increase in the usage of the free lunch program.

We will start with a modest space at Temple called "South Hill's Community Garden at Temple Emanuel" and hopefully will be able to expand in the future. A generous grant from South Hill Jewish Pittsburgh will make the initial garden and supplies possible. Seeds and/or plants will be provided by SHIM for chard, beans, kale, spinach and chives. The population served by SHIM also enjoys lemongrass, hibiscus, crabapples and dill.

If you already have a garden at home, consider planting a row with one of these items.

We will collect produce on Monday for a Tuesday drop off at SHIM. For those who really don't garden, volunteers are always needed at SHIM to weigh and organize the produce at the pantry. Won't you consider joining our efforts?

Do a Mitzvah! Help Homeless Families!!

Family Promise of Southwestern Pennsylvania connects homeless children and their families with a network of local congregations and dedicated staff who provide shelter, meals, hospitality and support until they are able to return to sustainable independent lives in their own homes. Over 40% of the homeless population is made up of families. Many shelters do not accept entire families and they have few options.

This community based program has a Day Center in Crafton which is their address of residence and base of operations for finding employment and permanent housing. Families have access to shower and laundry facilities, as well as childcare at the center. A fulltime caseworker is also there to provide assistance. The average stay for a family is 48 days and roughly 70% of them successfully return to sustainable housing.

The evening shelter and meals are provided by a network of host congregations. Each host congregation is assigned up to five weeks throughout the year. These host congregations are assisted by the support congregations.

Temple Emanuel is excited to support Bower Hill Community Church (BHCC) this year!

BHCC is responsible for four weeks during the year and Temple Emanuel has the following days: July 26, September 27 and December 27. We may wish to consider taking December 25 as a Mitzvah Day project. There will be training prior to the volunteer dates.

- Afternoon Van Driver (4:30 pm – 6:00 pm)
- Dinner Hosts (5:00 pm – 7:00 pm)
- Evening Hosts (7:00 pm – 9:00 pm)
- Overnight Hosts (9:00 pm – 6:30 am)
- Morning Van Driver (5:00 am – 7:00 am). The van is a fourteen passenger van.

THE PATH OF THE JUST



As you come to Temple, you see the unique brick pathway which starts at Temple's front plaza on Bower Hill Road and winds beside the sidewalk to the courtyard entrance. As new bricks are donated the pathway will continue along the back entrance, and finally to the ECDC School playground. Our goal is to fully encircle Temple with these beautiful brick tributes.

The cost of each brick is \$136 and may be inscribed for occasions such as:

-  celebrate the birth of a child or grandchild, a brit or a baby naming;
-  commemorate a teenager becoming bat or bar mitzvah and being confirmed;
-  memorialize loved ones who have departed;
-  acknowledge the members of your family for posterity;
-  record a special, sacred moment in your life;
-  honor someone who has influenced your life.

A Visit to Reggio Schools Sponsored by the Jewish Early Childhood Education Initiative (JECEI)

Recently I had an opportunity to travel to Washington DC together with Julie Silverman, ECDC Educator, and a group of Educators from Pittsburgh Jewish preschools. The opportunity was one of the benefits of our JECEI grant funded by the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh and the family of Martha Klein Lottman. We visited three Reggio early childhood centers including the JCC of Greater Washington and Temple Emanuel, located in Kensington, Maryland. The schools were utterly beautiful - filled with children's art and other displays that reflected the thought and values which generated these glorious creations.

Before even stepping foot into the schools, we were fortunate to meet with Mara Bier, Senior Education Officer of Early Childhood for the Jewish Federation of Greater Washington. We learned that there are 49 Jewish early childhood programs in the Washington DC area - 30 of which are inspired by the philosophy of Reggio Emilia.

This is no mere coincidence. The "founding parents" of JECEI, who chose Reggio as the model, participate in the national leadership of Jewish early education, including at the JCC Association of North America. How exciting to learn that our own Temple Emanuel Early Childhood Development Center of the South Hills has become part of this national movement! We can all take pride in the fact that our Jewish organizations have dedicated heart, soul and dollars to advocate for high quality early childhood education. Ms. Bier has been one of those leaders for decades. Beginning in the 1990's she has led groups of teachers to the city of Reggio Emilia and has taught Reggio workshops for a national and international forum. We are fortunate to have brilliant leadership in our region with Carolyn Linder who holds the corresponding position at the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh.

We believe that education is a reciprocal process where teachers set the stage by engaging children in discovery and respond to the multiple voices in the classroom. The collaborative process of research is continual and the child is a capable partner. This is a predisposition of both Jewish education and Reggio. As said by Loris Malaguzzi, the founder of the Reggio Emilia philosophy, "Learning and teaching do not stand on opposite banks and just watch the river flow by; instead they should embark together on a journey down the water. Through an active, reciprocal exchange, teaching can strengthen learning how to learn."

We are fortunate to be on this journey with our Jewish community both at home and across the nation.

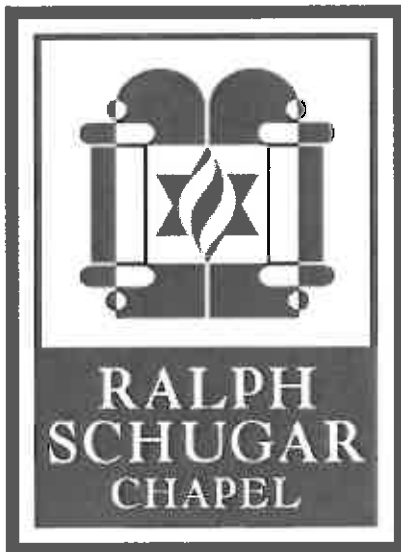
