My Bulletin tributes continue, this month to express my gratitude and yours to...

Life's Building Blocks

As I had anticipated for months prior, with the turn of the calendar to 2018, time has started tumbling toward June 30 and retirement. I now face a daunting task that I have anticipated not merely for months but for many years: What to do with all of my books?

Twenty or so years ago, I inventoried the books in my Temple study. They then numbered more than eight-hundred. Since then, I guesstimate that they've grown close to a thousand. I promised myself finally to face this daunting question come January of 2018. I strategized various destinations. First and foremost, home.

Home quickly taught me that this task is more than daunting. It is also emotional, ping-ponging between sweet and heart-rending. First, simple logistics. Between Alice and myself, our respective post-graduate educations and professional pursuits, we may have close to as many books at home as I have at Temple. Over the years, we added bookshelves to our individual work spaces to supplement a considerable library built by the previous owners, Temple's longtime members, the Pilossophs. We've maxed out all shelves. To bring books from Temple home means to cull books out. So far, I've donated seventy-eight books to the Mt. Lebanon Public Library, with more to come. Shlepping isn't the hard part. The hard part is recycling books that libraries and used book stores refuse. Recycling is a disingenuous term. Here, the emotional tugs begin.

Tossing beloved dog-eared paper backs into the recyclable trash is tough enough. Recycling hard cover books is tougher. Cutting apart books makes me shiver. Such has been the fate of all my college text books. Each one I had once pored over for many hours, underlining or highlighting, notating and studying. Now I reminisced and mourned as I took a razor knife to the bindings to separate the hard covers for trash and the pages for recycling. As a Jew and a rabbi, I recalled the Nazis' mass book burnings of 1933 and the Franciscans burning the tomes of Talmud in Paris in 1240.

As for you, please consider that who you are, what you are, where you find meaning in life, and often perhaps pleasure, all likely derive from books.

Setting the bar low, I googled "What are the requirements to become a garbage man?" (A pause to express my esteem and gratitude for garbage men in general, particularly in the midst of frigid winter days like this winter's, scorching summer days too, as well as the torrential rainy days of spring and fall!) To become a garbage man, a high school diploma or GED is required. To obtain either, books form the foundation.

As for you, take it from there how profoundly books have shaped your life. If you stacked all the books you've read in your life, the higher your pile, likely the deeper these books have shaped you and moved you, informed and inspired you to be who and what you are. Equally for me, but especially so for the Jewish people.

The Jewish people have a unique relationship with books. Historians propose that in our people's long saga, more than we have lived in places here and there, the Jewish people have lived in books.

God and Moses laid this cornerstone: Torah. The Prophets and Writings (Cont'd on page 2)

formed the biblical foundation. Mishnah, Talmud, Midrash, commentaries, rabbinic responsa and philosophical treatises all raised the walls, higher when necessary, with doors and windows whenever we could. Prayer books made the mortar holding everything together, morning, afternoon and evening, weekdays and most especially on Shabbat. When oppression forced us to flee from one place to another, the inherent genius and beauty of this unique Jewish construction shined forth. We could tuck all these bricks under our arm and take them with us. Mixing the mortar, i.e. praying, then was as easy as mixing earth and water. Thus, from place to place, we rebuilt our enduring home.

Many of my books will remain at Temple, relocated to the Pollon Family Library and the Community Room where they will be useful bricks for congregants as well as rabbis. More of my books will move to my home where I will rebuild them as rabbi emeritus. Wherever such good books are, they are the building blocks of life.

In next month's Bulletin, I will pay tribute to the masons who have given all of us the know-how to first measure and set the plumb line, then use the hammer and chisel, apply the mortar with trowel to place the bricks just so, to be who we are, do what we do, cherish what we cherish and face what life demands we face.

Biding Time Until Purim Comes

Be happy it's [almost] Adar!

That means that the holiday of Purim is nearly upon us! It's time to hear the *Megillah*...to cheer on the heroic actions of Mordechai and Esther (yay!), to drown out the evil plot of Haman (boo!)...and to view the Big Show – our Purim Shpiel (a funny retelling of the Megillah certain to be entertaining for all)! It's time to dress up, have fun at the carnival...and of course, to eat Hamantaschen!

But...since the beginning of the month of February doesn't coincide with the start of the month Adar, (which means we have to wait *nearly a whole month* until one of the *most* fun Jewish holidays is upon us)... besides carefully pianning your costume and marking your calendars to bake Hamantaschen (February 18th), party at the annual Purim Carnival at the JCC (February 25th), and dance the night away at the Purim Shpiel (February 28th), how are we to pass the time until the festivities begin? (Whew! That was a long sentence!) Try the following discussion starters and activities on for size...and get into the Purim spirit!

The Story of Purim

- Review the major players in the Megilla. Can you recall them all?
- Everyone has good and bad traits. What are the good things you can think of about each Purim character?
 (even Haman apparently was a capable administrator in the eyes of the King!). What are the bad things?
- Might there have been good reasons for Vashti to have refused the King? What could they have been?

Remembering

Remembering is an important part of the Purim story. Esther remembered...although she separated herself from the Jewish community when she became queen, she remembered her heritage when her people needed her to rescue them. The Jewish people also remember. Purim reminds us that in many times and places, enemies have sought to destroy the Jews.

- How does remembering history serve to teach us?
- In many communities, the Jews celebrate other, "little" Purims marking other deliverances from danger. What events in your family might warrant the celebration of a "little" Purim?
- Find out about the "little" Purims celebrated in other countries and share what you find.

Masquerading

Esther's Hebrew name was Hadassah. She chose however, to use Esther in the non-Jewish world of the palace. This was a form of disguise – a costume of sorts.

- Have you ever thought about changing your name to that of a more popular friend, movie idol, or sports hero? If you could change your name, what would it be? Why would you select that name?
- Years ago, when it was difficult for Jews to enter certain professions, many changed their names to less Jewishsounding names so that they could "pass" for non-Jews. What do you think of this practice?
- Was your family's last name changed when your ancestors immigrated to this country? Find out what it used to be if it was.
- How does dressing up/being in disguise help us to celebrate Purim?
- What are you planning to be this Purim?

Tzedakah

The celebration of Purim involves sending two kinds of gifts – Shalach Manot (gifts to one another) and matanot l'evyonim (gifts to the poor). Even the poor are supposed to give gifts – to those who are more needy!

- Make Shalach manot for family friends! Use small baskets or gift bags and fill them with Purim delicacies such as homemade hamantaschen, salted almonds, wine, grapes, and other sweets.
- Give food to those in need by bringing donations to Temple – when you come for services, Torah Center classes and of course, to celebrate Purim! Place them in the bins in the hallway near the parking lot door.
- What are other ways that we can help those in need?

So... Ready for Purim? I look forward to seeing you here at Temple for one of our many opportunities to celebrate it. Come in costume and don't forget – one can NEVER eat TOO many Hamantaschen!



Join historian and Temple member David Rosenberg at our newest exhibition as he comments on research that has influenced how a French city looks at its World War II past.

"Who is a Jew?" focuses on a set of photo identification cards of Jews from Amiens and its region to explore how French Jews self-identified when forced to register during the Nazi occupation of World War II. Dr. Rosenberg's research provides a chilling glimpse into the past and a reminder of a time in history that must never again repeat.

This research has led to some hopeful developments abroad, including the dedication last October of a commemorative plaque by the city authorities of Amiens at the site of the WWII-era synagogue."

Do a Mitzvah! Help Homeless Families!!

Family Promise of Southwestern Pennsylvania connects homeless children and their families with a network of local congregations and dedicated staff who provide shelter, meals, hospitality and support until they are able to return to sustainable independent lives in their own homes. Over 40% of the homeless population is made up of families. Many shelters do not accept entire families and they have few options.

This community based program has a Day Center in Crafton which is their address of residence and base of operations for finding employment and permanent housing. Families have access to shower, laundry facilities, as well as childcare at the center. A fulltime caseworker is also there to provide assistance. The average stay for a family is 48 days and roughly 70% of them successfully return to sustainable housing.

The evening shelter and meals are provided by a network of host congregations. Each host congregation is assigned up to five weeks throughout the year. These host congregations are assisted by the support congregations. All events take place at Bower Hill Community Church.

Temple Emanuel is excited to support Bower Hill Community Church (BHCC) for our third year!

BHCC is responsible for four weeks during the year and Temple Emanuel has the following days: March 27, June 12, September 4 and November 27.

The volunteer opportunities are: afternoon Van Driver (4:30 pm – 6:00 pm); dinner hosts (5:00 pm – 7:00 pm), evening hosts (7:00 pm – 9:00 pm), overnight hosts (9:00 pm – 6:30 am), morning van driver (5:00 am - 7:00 am). The van is a fourteen passenger van.






