Our Kids

Preface. I was a teenager when my mother said to me, "You should become a teacher; you love children!" Hmmm? The thought baffled me. My teenage mind was set on becoming either the first Jewish president of the United States or a Rock 'n' Roll star. You may remember the old TV show "Father Knows Best." In this case, "Mother Knew Best."

Several months ago I began compiling a mental list of "Things I'll Miss When I Retire." Proof of my mother's wisdom and prescience, the list began while I was meeting with one of our b'nei mitzvah students and parents.

What shall I say about our Temple kids?

I've known some of them since their Brit Milah or baby naming, some since pre-school and Torah for Tots. Annually and consistently, many of my most joyful moments have happened while teaching Jewish holidays to our ECDC kids. For the High Holy Days, when I've blown the shofar the kids covered their ears and squealed with delight. Which was louder: the shofar blasts or their squeals? But the din always awakened them to the meaning of the High Holy Days to be kind and fair to each other, to say "I'm sorry" when they are unfair or unkind to someone, and "I forgive you" when someone has been unfair or unkind to them, because God asks us to treat each other with kindness and fairness.

Sukkot is all about our senses and their beauty. I held the Lulav and Etrog together to show our kids how we are all together, and then waved the Lulav and Etrog in every direction, showing that God is everywhere.

For Chanukah, I'd take an empty glass and pitcher and pretend that I can pour all of the water in the pitcher into the glass without spilling a drop. I'd then pretend that I'm pouring all of the water back into the pitcher, filling the pitcher to brim. "Is this possible?" I ask. "No!" the kids shout. "What do we call this?" I ask. One of the kids is sure to respond, "A miracle." "And who alone can make miracles?" I then ask. Again one of the kids is sure to respond, "God!" I'd repeat this question over and over until the kids shout in unison, "God!" Thus the kids are ready to learn Chanukah's story of the one cruse of oil causing the Lamp in the ancient Temple to burn miraculously for eight days. Chanukah is also the story of religious freedom for all people to worship God, each in their unique way. With many of our ECDC kids Christian, Hindu or something other than Jewish, Chanukah offers a pertinent message for that time of year.

Passover has been the most fun for me, but the least fun for an ECDC teacher I select to role play with me, along with a student volunteer. I play Pharaoh who enslaves the Jewish people played by the teacher. I order the teacher to sweep the floor in the Beit HaT'fila, then wash the windows, then do both simultaneously (all pretend, but I'm still "mean"). The student volunteer then plays Moses, who says to me, "Shelach Ami (Hebrew), 'Let My People Go!" I, Pharaoh, just become "meaner," demanding that the teacher work harder and harder. The Plagues come, harsher and harsher. After each Plague, the student-Moses says to me-Pharaoh, "Shelach Ami, 'Let My People Go!" Finally, I-Pharaoh relent and let the Jewish people go, led by the student-Moses. But then I-Pharaoh send my Host after the teacher-Jews to bring her-them back to slavery. At God's command, the student-Moses parts the waters of the Red Sea, portrayed by the center aisle. The teacher-Jews then pass safely to the other side. I-now-Pharaoh's-Host chase them

down the center aisle. Student-Moses then gathers the waters back together, and I-Pharaoh's-Host disappear behind the back row of chairs. Everyone laughs a big belly laugh, including me. But the mood turns serious when I ask the student-Moses if it was hard to say to me-Pharaoh, "Shelach Ami, 'Let My People Go!" The answer always is "Yes." I then emphasize one of Judaism's central messages to the world to speak truth to power, even when it's so difficult, even scary.

Of course, I've known most of our kids through their enrollment in Torah Center, some since Kindergarten or pre-K, and others ever since their families moved to Pittsburgh more recently. Regardless of how long, by the time they become bar and bat mitzvah I've known all of them well. Thus I say the following with utter confidence. They are all different from one another, but what I've repeated countless times to our parents over the years is that all of our kids are beautiful, each in his or her own way.

The Book of Proverbs provides the compass I've used to guide our kids through bar and bat mitzvah: "Educate a child, each in their own way, and even when they're old, they will not depart from it." When people have wondered how I am so on-target when I speak to each child at every bar and bat mitzvah, Proverbs has opened my eyes and heart to their uniqueness.

Among all the "Thank You" Shabbat services so far (as I write in mid-March), the "Thank You" Shabbat service for all the b'nei mitzvah kids and their families was the best attended, close to filling the Beit HaT'fila.

All of the above now said, it should come as no surprise that my last "Thank You" Shabbat service will be for Temple Confirmands over the decades. The Confirmation year had been my opportunity to spend the entire year with our kids in class. This tenth grade year is a time of tremendous growth physically and emotionally for the kids as they transition from age fifteen to sixteen. Carpe Diem, Carpe Annum and thank God that I've seized the opportunity to nurture our kids spiritually and intellectually. At the same time, I've lamented that too many kids disappear from Temple after they became bar and bat mitzvah. I've lamented that Monday evening schedule conflicts are more numerous than ever, especially for our multi-talented kids. Even among the kids who continue to Confirmation, absenteeism is often an issue. In addition, for the sake of our South Hills Jewish community high school efforts, now J Line run by the JCC, I've sacrificed almost half of what had been my time with our kids for decades. But Lamentations is my least favorite book of the Bible, so enough with laments. I've loved the time I've spent with these kids, and I intend to fully express my gratitude to them at the last of my "Thank You" Shabbat services on May 25. This Shabbat evening is Memorial Day weekend. I chose this Shabbat expressly with the knowledge that Confirmands from years past who are now living out of town will thereby have the opportunity to return to Pittsburgh on this holiday weekend.

Please, if you know of any, contact them now to save the date, and send me their contact information so that I can extend a personal invitation.

One thing in particular that will not conclude with my retirement is the *naches* I derive in following the lives of our kids as they grow to adulthood. As kids, they may be different from each other, but they all possess great promise, each in his and her own way. How wonderful to see that promise realized when they become adults!

Lingering Lessons

[This month I want to re-share an article I wrote a long time ago (13 years?!)... Its message is still relevant today.]

I love Passover. It is without a doubt, my favorite holiday. I have many fond memories of Seders at my grandparents' house, of times when the whole family joined together in the festive and joyous holiday meal. Food was always at the center of my family's celebration and remembrance of our people's journey from slavery to freedom. Each year as Passover approached, I looked forward to the many foods that only seemed to appear at this time of year: Chopped liver, macaroons, charoset, gefilte fish, hard-boiled eggs in saltwater... and of course fried matzah – a breakfast favorite in my household. Yet, by the end of the week, the thrill of eating differently would begin to wear thin and I was (and am) always all too happy to return to my bread eating ways.

And so Passover ends. We put away our unused boxes of matzah. We store our Haggadot and special dishes until next year's Seder. But let us not be in such a hurry to forget one of the important lessons that the holiday of Passover holds for us.

What lesson are we to keep with us throughout the year? Twice during the Seder we welcome those without a place to go into our homes. The first time is near the beginning when we hold the matzah in the air and claim it to be the 'Bread of Affliction.' That important Aramaic passage is an invitation. "All who are hungry may come and eat..." On Passover, we are to make our festival tables places where all are welcome.

The second time comes near the end of the Seder. Before we bless and drink the fourth cup of wine, many of us open our doors to invite the prophet Elijah to join us. Why? Tradition tells us that Elijah visits every Jewish home on the night of Passover delivering the hope of redemption. But there is another reason why we open our doors wide that evening. We do so, to again be inviting and welcoming to those who have no Seder of their own. An open door sends a clear message that all are welcome.

This is a message that we can keep with us long after the last piece of matzah is eaten. We can leave the doors of our homes and our Temple "open" to those who wish to join us. We can make all feel welcome.

How do we do this? It's simple, really. We begin by doing the mitzvah of *Hachnasot Orchim*, or welcoming the stranger, the person we have not yet had the opportunity to meet. Yes, this means those who are new to the congregation, but it can be applied as well to all whom are members within our Temple Emanuel family.

We can be welcoming by getting to know each other. How many of us stop to say hello, or to introduce ourselves to people we do not know? Do we ask our friends, "Who is that?" or do we approach the person and find out for our-selves? Do we invite others to sit next to us at services, or at a congregational function? The personal touch adds so much.

Our tradition reminds us that we have an obligation to greet each other, to be welcoming to those around us. The Talmud teaches that it was said of Rabbi Yochanan ben Zakkai that no person ever greeted him first. [B.Brachot 17a] The rabbis saw this as a sort of challenge, a motivation to greet everyone they encountered. Perhaps it is meant to challenge us as well.

The mere gesture of a simple greeting - saying "hello" or "good morning" or "Shabbat Shalom" - establishes a human connection where none might have existed previously. It says, "I care about you. I am glad you are here." A warm greeting transforms a group of people with no link to each other into a community that cares about its members.

We can make our homes and our congregation places of warmth and welcome. We can create a sense of community and support. And most important, we can overcome the isolation and alienation that too many of us feel when surrounded by others with whom we wish to connect.

Passover is over. It will be another year until we again gather around the Seder Table and invite the prophet Elijah to join us. But let it not be that long until we welcome each other into our homes and our lives. If only we leave our doors "open," we can get to know each other and transform ourselves and our community.

A Post-Passover challenge: Next time you are at Temple, introduce yourself to three people you have not yet met...I look forward to hearing about the experience!

Presenting: "Bagel Bakers Union, Local 338: A Remembrance."

The skilled craftsmen of Bagel Bakers Union, Local 338, made virtually every bagel in New York City. Even into the 1950s, all members were Jewish and the minutes of its meetings were taken in Yiddish. Local 338 was merged out of existence in 1971, the victim of refrigeration, changing tastes and most notably the introduction of the automated bagel baking machine, but it left behind an absorbing story – one of assimilation, of technology's disruptive impact and, of course, the decline of trade unionism.

Horowitz will draw on newspaper accounts, articles both scholarly and from the popular press, his analysis of NLRB decisions involving the union and his interviews with surviving Local 338 members.
