The Reality of All that is Good

I must dedicate my last Temple Emanuel Bulletin article to the Reason that all of us are here. Notice the capitalized "Reason."

Each of us has many reasons why we are here, individually and personally, as well as collectively in family, in community and as citizens of the world. These many reasons imbue our lives with meaning, value and inspiration. Some reasons we consciously conceive and pursue. Other reasons life thrusts upon us, whether we want them or not. Many uplift us. Others humble us. All shape us into the unique being that each one of us is.

But there is one Reason above all, and that is why i capitalize it. We are all here as an act of God. Lest we forget it, and many (most?) people often do, our ancient sages taught that all of us have three parents: mother, father and God.

In Judaism, God has many names. Ei, Elohim, Ei Shaddai, HaRachaman, HaKadosh Baruch Hu are some of the many. Kabbalah proposes that the Torah in its entirety is one of God's names, 304,805 letters long. But God's quintessential Name is the unpronouncable Yod-Heh-Vav-Heh. We speak it in euphemism, "Adonai." Some Jews believe that even the euphemism is sacred, thus they render the euphemism in euphemism, "HaShem," "The Name." Even in writing and even in English, God's Name becomes a euphemism: Y-H-W-H.

Y-H-W-H derives from the Hebrew infinitive, L'hiyot, "To be." At its essence, God's Name means "Is-ness." Of course, no such word exists in English, but the meaning of Y-H-W-H in Hebrew can only be conveyed by coining such a word, albeit only partially at best. Nonetheless, I am, you are, everyone and everything is because of God's Is-ness, Is-ness now and Is-ness eternal.

Yet God is more than mere Is-ness. As God's first act asserts, Is-ness is also the source of goodness. "God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light. And God saw the light, that it was good."

When Moses met God at the Burning Bush, he asked God's Name. "Eheyeh Asher Eheyeh," God responded. Eheyeh derives also from L'hiyot, "To be." Among its various translations, God's response is "I am what I am" or "I will be what I will be." Implicit therein is another meaning: "God is not what God isn't." To those who would ascribe life's pain - human suffering, cruelty and violence - to God, this meaning is God's rejoinder. Human suffering, cruelty and violence are not God's doing. On the contrary, God is the Reason for goodness, and the eternal Reality (again capitalized) of goodness.

Given that the Torah has no vowels, we can also read God's answer to Moses as "Eheyeh Osher Eheyeh." This meaning is electrifying: "I am happiness, I am," or "I will be happiness, I will be."

For this, my last Temple Bulletin article, the words that might otherwise elude me to express my thanks and yours are found in our prayer book Mishkan T'filah, (Cont'd, on page 2)

which abounds exquisite expressions of gratitude. Consider two prayers in particular.

The first thanksgiving prayer begins P'sukei D'zimrah, "Verses of Praise" in the morning service. I myself pray it every weekday morning, but at Temple Emanuel we skip it according to a standard that prayer should be a finite quantity not an infinite quality. But here and now, touch and be touched by the Eternal:

Blessed is the One who spoke and the world came to be.

Blessed is the Onel

Blessed is the One who continually authors creation.

Blessed is the One whose word is deed.

Blessed is the One who decrees and fuifills.

Blessed is the One who is compassionate towards the world.

Blessed is the One who is compassionate towards all creatures.

Blessed is the One who rewards the reverent.

Blessed is the One who exists for all time.

Blessed is the One who redeems and saves.

Blessed is God's Name!

With songs of praise we extol you and proclaim your Sovereignty,

for you are the Source of life in the universe.

One God, Life of the universe, praised and glorious Ruler,

Your Name is Eternal.

Blessed are You, Adonai, Sovereign who is glorified through praise.

The second prayer you know well, at least in the original Aramaic: the Kaddish. In tradition, there are five Kaddishs: Half, Whole, Mourners', Rabbis', and Final recited at the conclusion of the study of a tractate of Talmud or at a funeral. But you may not know its awe inspiring meaning. Here and now, touch and be touched by the Eternal:

Exalted and hallowed be God's great Name,

in the world which God created, according to plan.

May God's majesty be revealed in the days of our lifetime

and the life of all Israel - speedily, imminently.

To which we say: Amen,

Blessed be God's great Name to all eternity.

Biessed, praised, honored, exalted,

extolled, glorified, adored and lauded

be the Name of the Holy Blessed One,

beyond all earthly words and songs of blessing, praise and comfort.

To which we say: Amen.

For us and all Israel, may the blessing of peace

and the promise of life come true,

and let us respond: Amen.

May the One who causes peace to reign in the high heavens,

let peace descend on us, and on all Israel, and on all the world,

and let us respond: Amen.

Summer is a GREAT Time for Learning

Believe it or not, summertime is upon us. Less hectic days and schedules, vacations, time by the pool or away at summer camp...all those things are on the horizon. These are called the 'lazy days of summer' with good reason; during the summer months, there is a tendency to shy away from anything that resembles learning. We too often see the summer as a time to "take a break" or to "let our minds rest." And yet, in *Pirke Avot* we find: "... do not say, 'When I am free, I will study,' for perhaps you will not become free ..." In other words, don't wait until that perfect time to study. It may never come. Don't wait until the fall to learn; study now, while we can, because there may not be a better time than the present – during *this* summer.

That doesn't mean that we have to sign up for university classes or spend hours pouring over reference books at the library. It does mean, however, that we should find a few moments each day to enrich ourselves and our lives as well by learning something new.

And it's not as difficult as one might think. The opportunities are endless. Here are some suggestions:

 Discuss the weekly Torah portion. Come to Torah study here at Temple (Saturdays, 9 am) or talk about it at home with your family... look to http://www.reformjudaism.org/learning/torah-study for resources that can help students of all ages (tots to adults!)

resources that can help students of all ages (tots to adults!) learn about the weekly Torah reading. There you will find commentaries to explore as well as discussion topics to engage the whole family in discussion. It's amazing just how much the ancient lessons are still relevant today.

Catch up on your Jewish reading. There are so many great books to read! And many of them have Jewish themes. Visit the library here at Temple - our librarian, Paula Altschul can certainly point interested readers in the right direction! The URJ (Union of Reform Judaism) has also made some recommendations. Check out the lists and individual book discussion notes published here: http://www.reformjudaism.org/sitesearch?keyword=jewish+books. Looking for lighter reading? Check out Reform Judaism's Blog: http://www.reformjudaism.org/blog or look at any of the articles on the Jewish parenting site Kveller: http://www.kveller.com/. Want Jewish news?-Read Tablet, an online magazine, http://www.tabletmag.com/, The Forward, an online newspaper, http://www.forward.com or the posts of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, http://www.jta.org/ to be in the know. In the app department, there are simply too many to list here. Go to

your favorite app store and search for **Jewish News** – and choose the apps for newspapers, magazines, bible translations, books, etc. that interest you.

- Venture into the world of podcasts. Check out https://reformjudaism.org/learning/podcasts to find a new story to listen to each week. Listen to "Stories We Tell" and tap into Judaism's rich tradition of storytelling and enjoy this collection of great ones. Or sign up for Union of Reform Judaism President Rick Jacobs' "On the Other Hand: 10 Minutes of Torah" and hear his weekly Torah insights on how Judaism continues to have a contemporary influence on our lives. Looking for video to accompany the audio? Check out the Jewish version of TED talks. Go to https://elitalks.org/ to find out more.
- Make space In your inbox for Jewish listservs and discussions. The URJ offers a few that you can sign up for through its "Ten Minutes of Torah" Initiative. Each day of the week offers a different essay or article relating to that day's theme or category. To find out more, or to sign up, go to: https://reformjudaism.org/learning/ten-minutes-torah. Or check out the numerous Jewish Blogs that send weekly posts...find one of interest and sign up!
- Browse the Internet for Interesting Jewish news. Interested in Israel? Check out http://www.israel21c.org/ a site dedicated to news about Israel that is beyond the conflict. It highlights some of the fascinating and newsworthy things happening in Israel on a daily basis. Interested in history? Specifically Jewish events and dates of importance here in America? Visit http://iwa.org/thisweek to see what has happened this week in years past.
- Help your kids to remember what they learned in their Torah Center classes. Review the alef-bet with them, or (if you don't have school aged children, or even if you do!) learn it for yourself! There are a few websites that can help. Don't hesitate to call the Education Office here at Temple. We are happy to provide CD-Roms, or workbooks designed for home use. Additionally, there are a few websites that can help. For starters, go to





COMING TO TERMS 9th Anniversary Edition



An article in the April 15, 2018 Villages Daily Sun presented common challenges faced by individuals as they age. They found that the biggest emotional impact when

people reach age 70 is figuring out what to do with their time. By then, most people have retired and are faced with trying to make their lives as meaningful as they were when they worked.

Our young-at-heart, active retiree team found an answer to that issue by coming to TERMS with their retirement.

Temple Emanuel Retirees in Mitzvah Service (TERMS) celebrated its ninth birthday in 2018. TERMS' vision is... To support our Temple's needs, while enriching our own lives through the mitzvahs we perform and the friendships we develop amongst our teammates and the Temple family we serve. The twin goals of maintaining a strong team spirit while taking personal ownership for the mitzvahs we perform are at the center of that vision. Some of our activities are outlined below.

Our fifth annual TERMS Shabbat was held on July 29th 2017. Those special services would not have been possible without the active involvement of Rabbi Mahler, and many TERMS members.

Seventeen TERMS members worked as one to make **our eighth Memorial Day Bagel Brunch** the best ever, with almost 150 people in attendance. As in previous years, the Bagel Brunch was free, with costs defrayed by a 50/50 raffle.

During the past year, **Carol Rose** orchestrated two separate Meals for 40 at Miryam's Place, a shelter for homeless women. These meals, prepared by TERMS members, owe their genesis to the Social Action Team. Carol also coordinates all the Miryam's Place meals originating at Temple Emanuel.

During the past year, **Ed and Roz Friedman** added new materials to the Temple Emanuel Library Archives, which contain an array of materials dating from Temple's inception in 1951 to the present. They also maintained documentation to describe the archives' contents. This project is an ongoing effort to update and maintain the Temple archives on a continuing basis.

TERMS members also supported a wide range of Temple events including the **Labor Day Picnic** and **ushering at the High Holiday Services; Milt Wolf, Carol Rose, and Roger Liss** stuffed over 600 invitations for the Rabbi's Gala; **Lynn**

and Harvey Rubin, Linda Scott and Will Joseph worked to keep the Holocaust Garden beautiful; Roberta Carr and Penny Abrams regularly helped the office with monthly mailing of the Temple Bulletin; Roberta also volunteered in the Temple Gift Shop; Lee Feldman, Carol, and Roger were greeters at Purimshpiel and collected over \$220 and 220 boxes of Mac & cheese for the SHIM food bank.

All work and no play is no fun, so Carol and Byron Rose hosted our **Eighth Annual TERMS' Active Member Party**, a Yom Kippur break-the-fast, at their home.

Where do we go from here? That's up to our *TERMS* members...old and new...and a continuing flow of new assignments for us to undertake. If the past is any indication, our future is unlimited... both in the number of active members we attract (membership is open to the men and women of Temple Emanuel who are retirees, or plan on retirement in the coming year), and the number of exciting projects we agree to undertake.






