From Rabbi Don Rossoff

Coming Home

In a few days, we will gather together for what has been called the Jewish People's annual Homecoming. Regardless of what may or may not have been the rest of the year, Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur are the sacred days during which serious Jews come home to their synagogues, to their communities, to their faith, to their people, and, for some, to their God.

Coming home feels good, especially when it is coming home to what we are used to. The feeling is akin to the experience of slipping on a pair of old slippers: warm, comfortable, familiar, and safe.

Of course, this year, the High Holy Days will not be exactly what you are used to. While the liturgy will not change and the music will be 99.9% identical to what has been, it will be I, not Rabbi Mahler, standing at the pulpit, leading, preaching, and teaching, in my own style with my own demeanor. We know that the same words spoken by a different voice is a huge change, and that it takes time for a new normal to feel normal. But going by what I have experienced in my three other interim positions, it will not take long before most people settle back and say, "Yes, it is different, but it is still home."

So with this one (huge) exception (me), most everything will remain as it has been. However, I do want to share with you one thing which will be different: a ritual moment on Yom Kippur morning which I have practiced in other congregations and which some congregations have been doing for years. In the spirit of making these Holy Days a homecoming for all of our members, I will be calling our members from other faith backgrounds up to the bimah for a special blessing for all that

they do to support their Jewish families and the Temple. It is a blessing and a thank you well-earned, creating a moment of coming home both powerful and beautiful.

Of course, the Days of Awe are much more than a yearly homecoming. They call us to look at ourselves and our relationships – both critically and compassionately. They call us to ask forgiveness from those whom we have hurt, even if unintentionally, and to offer forgiveness to those who demonstrate true remorse. Along with forgiving others, we also are called upon to forgive ourselves just as God forgives us. (Not easy, I know, but important and deserved.)

But is not reconciling with others and ourselves a kind of coming home? And is not taking an honest look at ourselves and crossing the bridge linking the selves we are with the selves we would strive to become also a homecoming of sorts? I believe they are. In a real sense, moral and spiritual growth is a homecoming, a coming home to our higher selves, the image of Divinity within, which waits for our approach with open arms. These most Holy Days call us home: home to our community, home to our heritage, home to our highest selves, home to the God of our understanding.

And this year especially they call to us all: Come home to Temple Emanuel!

L'shanah tovah tikatayvun – May you and yours be inscribed for a happy, healthy, meaningful, and fulfilling New Year,

FOCUS ON: Bat/Bar Mitzvah Services

Planning to attend an upcoming Shabbat service to celebrate with one of our Bar/Bat Mitzvah students and their family? Here are some of the changes you will notice in the Friday evening and Saturday morning services.

Friday Evening

 On Friday evening, the family will be called up for the candle lighting and the Kiddush, with parents each reading a prayer in Hebrew or English.

Saturday Morning

- There will be an opportunity for an English prayer to be read by younger siblings.
- The Torah will be symbolically passed through the generations, involving parents and grandparents, including non-Jewish parents and grandparents if they so choose.
- As the Torah is passed from the parent(s) to the student, a parent may read a brief (250 words) address to their child.
- The first part of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah's D'var Torah (speech) will serve as the introduction to the Torah reading.
- There will generally be five Aliyot in a service, the first being the "Community Aliyah" and the rest designated as "Family Aliyot" which can be shared by multiple people:

Aliyah 1 Community members
Aliyah 2 Uncles, aunts, cousins
Aliyah 3 Grandparents

Aliyah 4 Parents

Aliyah 5 Bar/Bat Mitzvah student

- The Bar/Bat Mitzvah students will generally be reading or chanting the 4 family aliyot.
- Each Aliyah can be shared by multiple persons. If there are few family members, friends may be called up.

Because each of our students is unique, we encourage children to work to their full potential and to participate in the service in ways that suit their abilities and skills.

As always, members of the congregation are encouraged to attend services and celebrate this important milestone with our B'nai Mitzvah students and their families.

Please feel free to speak with Rabbi Rossoff or Rabbi Locketz to discuss how this might work with your family.

To Learn and To Teach

Is it really September already?

Hard as it is to believe, the summer is over. It is time once again, to think about school – gathering notebooks and textbooks, buying new supplies, and being reunited with friends not seen since last spring. It is an exciting time of year – for our children as they start a new year of learning, and for us as well, as we keep busy making sure that everything is in place for the start of midweek Torah Center and J Line classes on September 12th, and the beginning of the B'nei Mitzvah Club and Sunday Torah Center classes on September 16th.

Judaism has been a long time proponent of education, both in the secular realm as well as in the religious one. The need for instruction in and understanding of mathematics, reading, science and English – stems from an obvious need to succeed in this world. But the teaching and mastering of Hebrew language, Jewish history and ritual...why are these subjects important too?

The answer may not be as readily apparent, yet I would argue that the need for Jewish learning is as important as the need for secular studies. Why so? Our very survival depends on it. It has been this way since biblical times: Take to heart these instructions with which I charge you this day. Teach them to your children (Deuteronomy 6:6-7). The message is clear. What God tells our people is to be repeated to the generation that follows; the laws and rituals that are so important to our people are to be passed down from parents to children; from teachers to students. In this way, our survival is insured. Our tradition assures us that as long as there is someone to teach – a parent or a teacher – and as long as there is a pupil – a child or a student - willing to learn, our way of life will continue.

Wow. It goes without saying that we have quite a task before us. It is one in which we need to share the responsibility. Each of us has to do our part: to teach, to learn and to make sure that the process happens the way that it should. So, what does this mean for us? Simply that it is up to each of us to make our Jewish learning experiences worthwhile. It is our job as student, teacher, parent, child...to be involved as teacher, as learner, as Jews... we have to do our part to make our time spent in the Torah Center is worthwhile, rewarding, and memorable.

Parents: I encourage you to be role models for your children. Show them how important Jewish learning is at all stages of life. Take advantage of our many adult learning opportunities and then share with your children what new skills and insights you gained. Make Jewish learning something that is important to your family and watch how it can bring your family together!

Students: You have a lot to learn and a lot to teach as well! I hope you will see your Torah Center classes as a mutual learning experience – one in which you will learn together with your teachers and classmates. Come to class expecting to share your opinions and to hear the great ideas of your peers and you may be surprised at how much you can learn from each other!

Teachers and staff (including myself!): We have much to teach and much to learn... Let us remember that we too are students – always learning, always growing - we too are not done questioning and wondering about the ways of the world. It is an honor to teach and a privilege to learn; may we find both experiences to be immensely rewarding.

It is hard not to be excited about all that lies before us. I look forward to teaching and learning and most of all, to being together once again.

President's Message

Happy New Year! May 5779 be a sweet and prosperous year for all! This next year will be an exciting time for Temple Emanuel. The focus will continue on connections – with each other and our greater Temple Emanuel community. We will also focus on

our goals, vision and mission to propel Temple Emanuel into the future.

Our most notable new addition is Rabbi Rossoff and his wife Fran. As we are going through transition and experimentation, Rabbi Don has begun to prepare us well for our next rabbi.

The Settled Rabbi Search Committee (SRSC) is well under way and by the time the High Holidays begin, the application for our new Settled Rabbi will have been submitted to the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR). Resumes are expected to begin arriving shortly after the High Holidays followed by the process of narrowing candidates down to our next Settled Rabbi. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Michelle Markowitz, as Chair, and the SRSC for all the work they have undertaken beginning this spring and through this summer. As fall and winter take hold, I recommend that you keep up-to-date on the SRSC through the Rabbinic Transition blog on our website.

Our new Board of Trustees will have a full plate this year as we plan for exciting times ahead. Some of our goals that followed from the Focus Groups and Congregational Survey include:

- Remaining fiscally sound.
- Prioritizing social, educational and service opportunities that will engage a broad range of community members with a particular emphasis on our youth.
- Focus on inclusivity including welcoming interfaith families as well as those in multi-racial and samesex relationships.

In addition, the Board is utilizing the 2017 Greater Pittsburgh Jewish Community Study that was sponsored by the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh. Greater Pittsburgh's Jewish community numbers nearly 50,000 Jewish adults and children in nearly 27,000 households. The South Hills area is now home to 20% of all Jewish households. The results of the survey were announced late this spring. Some highlights include:

- Approximately one third of households belong to synagogue with one-quarter dues paying members to brick & mortar synagogue.
- Approximately half inmarried households are synagogue members vs. one third intermarried households.

- South Hills residents are far less likely to have attended High Holy Day services (30%) compared to rest of region (52%).
- For participation in ritual practices (light Hanukkah candles, attend Passover Seder, light Shabbat candles, have Shabbat meal, fast on Yom Kippur, observe any kosher law), South Hills residents are far less likely compared to the rest of the region.
- Very few 18-34 year olds (3%) belong to brick & mortar dues paying synagogues and one-third belong to any synagogue.
- Only one-quarter of 50-64 year olds and one third of 65+ year old are synagogue members.
- Of households that do not currently belong to a synagogue. 40% formerly did so. Approximately half indicated that they weren't religious, one quarter cited cost of membership and one-quarter indicated membership was not a priority.
- Seventy-six percent of children in Jewish households are being raised Jewish in some way. Among children with intermarried parents, 33% are being raised exclusively Jewish, either by religion or culturally. Fifty-two percent of Jewish children in grades K-12 participated in at least one Jewish educational program in the past year.
- Thirty-nine percent of Jewish adults engaged in some volunteer activity in the past month.
- Ninety-three percent of Jewish adults made charitable donations in the past year.
- Approximately one-third of Pittsburgh-area Jewish adults feel very connected to Israel.

We look forward to utilizing this information as we consider our next steps. This is a year of change and transition. We are happy for you to provide input and volunteer to keep Temple Emanuel moving towards the future. Shana Tova!

Order of Service:

We earnestly pray that it will be a year of love, happiness and peace for our family, for the Jewish people, and for all humanity. May the old year and its ills end now together. May the New Year and its blessings begin now together. (Candles are lit)

Baruch Ata Adonai, Eloheinu melech ha-olam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu l'hadlik ner shei Yom Tov.

Blessed are You, O Lord, our God, the Ruling Spirit of the Universe, who has enabled our people to achieve holiness through the mitzvah of kindling the lights of the New Year. May our home be consecrated, O God, by Your light. May it shine upon us all in blessing, as the light of love and peace. Amen.

READER:

(Lifts wine cup) With this symbol of joy, we give thanks for the blessings which this New Year's day brings to us. Happy are we that have been granted another year of life. We ask God for the strength to invest this life with profound meaning in the coming days.



ECDC Open Advisory Board Meetings - Three Years of Preparation

Experience the joy of learning. Three years ago when ECDC first

received the Pittsburgh JECEI grant, the Advisory Board began to think of ways to share leadership with the wider parent community. After all, collaboration among children, teachers and parents is the hallmark of the Reggio Emilia approach to education. But such transformation does not occur in a day. Over these past three years, ECDC has made countless adjustments in approach and in practice that made way for the first Open Advisory Board meeting that took place on the evening of August 7, 2018.

Some of the past lessons-learned were about how to invite others in truly welcoming ways. "Open Advisory Board meeting" sounds important, but does not exactly convey welcoming, so we came up with the title "ECDC Community/Kehillah\Gathering." Even the punctuation / \ represents a sense of safety! We sent out email invitations that included the outline of the agenda so that people knew what to expect. We reached out to many parents individually.

Thirty seven teachers, parents and members of the board packed into the WRJ Room (aka Music Room) while others provided care for the children. (One thing we have learned is that we cannot welcome parents to an evening meeting without offering babysitting.) A beautiful spread of wine, cheese and fruit was prepared by Melinda Freed and a wonderful slide show was prepared by Ellen Drook. Both Rabbis of Temple Emanuel introduced themselves as "Rabbis of all - whether Temple member or not, whether Jewish or not".

Like all Temple committees, the ECDC Advisory Board consists of Temple members. At any given time a few current ECDC parents may sit on the board. All ECDC parents are, by default, members of the Parent Teacher Partnership (PTP). The purpose of an open board meeting is to share dialogue between these two groups. We began the August 7th meeting with background information to bring everyone to common understanding of history, goals and vision. Then the meeting was open to questions, suggestions and comments. Parents also completed a form to indicate their interests, suggestions and ways they wish to be involved. We were happy to receive many offers for participation from gardening, woodworking and music making to data analysis! And two parents even offered to co-chair ECDC annual fundraising event Designer Bag Bingo.

ECDC Community/Kehillah\Gatherings will take place on a quarterly basis. The next meetings will be on the Monday evenings of Nov 19, Feb 18 and May 20. The topics will be based on parent suggestions and the teachers will help to facilitate. ECDC will continue to welcome dialogue at these meetings and every day in between.

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
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
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
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
