Chanukah and Christmas?

A few years ago, when Chanukah and Thanksgiving overlapped, American Jews celebrated what many called "Thanksgivikah." This year, Chanukah falls in the middle between Thanksgiving and Christmas, so Chanukah simply gets to be Chanukah. But when Chanukah and Christmas overlap, do we call it Christmakah? Chanumas? I think not.

A common perception is that Chanukah is the Jewish Christmas. If you look hard enough in the stores, you can probably find a rack with Chanukah decorations and cards in the holiday aisle. Chanukah songs are de rigueur at school Christmas/Holiday/Winter concerts, even when it may have been weeks since the last candle on the menorah has sputtered out.

Clearly, Chanukah is not the Jewish Christmas. Having said that, I appreciate Chanukah's proximity to this beautiful and Christianly meaningful Christian High Holy Day. It is a good time to have what Chanukah bestows, which is a perspective on how to live as Jews in a non-Jewish culture along with the Maccabean resolve to do so. You see, what we call the Holiday of Freedom is really about the freedom to be who and what we are. and not to be who and what we are not. This, even as we are immersed in a dominant non-Jewish culture which is beautiful, inviting, and which presents itself as normative.

Here's the essential Chanukah story: After Alexander the Great conquered the lands around the Mediterranean and beyond, Greek culture, known as Hellenism, spread far beyond the borders of Greece. Greek culture emphasized beauty, rationality (of a

sorts), the life of the intellect (for some), and the perfection of the physical body. Hellenism also planted the seeds of what we know as democracy. In the second century Before the Common Era, Hellenistic culture attracted many newly urbanized citizens of the vassal state of Judea. These Jews were attracted away from the heritage of their ancestors and drawn into the life of the Greek gymnasia. There, they pursued the beauty of the body and the expansion of the mind. For many, Jewish observance - prayer, kashrut, Shabbat - fell to the wayside. They were part of a larger, more universal and "modern" culture, and that was fine with them.

It was not so fine, however, for rural Jews like Mattathias and his family. Followers of "that ol' time religion," they saw their tradition being trampled and subsumed by Hellenism. They could not abide by the fact that Jews. especially upper-class Jews, had no problem with polytheism being introduced into the Holy Temple of the one true God. While Hellenism celebrated the holiness of beauty, Judaism celebrated the beauty of holiness. The Maccabean war which this cultural conflict sparked was multifaceted and fought on many fronts. Suffice to say, in many ways. Judah Maccabee was battling assimilated Jews as much as he was fighting the Syrian/Greek armies. He and his people understood how inviting Greek culture was and how assimilating into it would mean the end of the Jewish People and the Jewish understanding of Deity.

While the Maccabees were ultimately victorious (that's complicated, too), it (Cont'd. on page 2)

did not mean that they and those who came after them rejected Hellenism whole hog (sorry). Resisting "assimilation," they opted for "acculturation." Assimilation happens when a minority culture loses the boundaries which keep it distinct from the majority culture. Acculturation is when a minority maintains its cultural distinctiveness while incorporating aspects of the majority culture which further its own aims. So while not losing their cultural and religious distinctiveness, our ancestors took various aspects of Greek culture and made them Jewish. The form of the Greek symposium which included philosophical discourse over an extended meal was overlaid with Jewish content and gave us the Pesach Seder. The Rabbinic process of uncovering God's laws through discussion, debate, and ultimately voting, had its roots in Greek democracy. Even the word synagogue is Greek, meaning a place where people learn together.

In a sense, our ancestors were able to look at the dominant culture in which they lived, say that it was beautiful but it was not theirs, take the best it had to offer, and use it to enrich and further Jewish life. This was true in the time of the Maccabees and has been true ever since.

Which brings us back to Christmas. The spirit of the Maccabees lives on when we can listen to, perhaps even sing, the beautiful Christmas songs, delight in the pretty Christmas displays, join Christian family and friends as they celebrate their holiday (just as we invite them to our Seders), greet everyone, as Shamai taught, with a cheerful countenance (Pirkay Avot, 1:15), and still know that we are "in it" but not "of it."

And if you miss having something green in your house to decorate, try building a sukkah. Want to instill in your children the spirit of holiday sharing? Set aside at least one night of Chanukah for giving rather than getting. Longing to feel and spread "Peace on Earth and Good Will to People" and feel that you are living in proto-messianic time? Simply check out Shabbat. And how blessed we are that Shabbat comes, not once a year, but once a week!

Ashreinu, ma tov chelkeinu, u'ma naim goraleinu, u'ma yafa y'rushateinu! How happy are we, how good our portion, how pleasant our lot, how beautiful our heritage!

Solidarity Shabbat

The following are the words I shared when we came together for Solidarity Shabbat on the First Friday of November. It truly was a special Shabbat – coming together as a community to embrace each other with support and comfort as we reeled from the events of the week prior. As I reflect on that evening, I know that was the place I needed to be: surrounded by friends and neighbors, Jews and non-Jews alike. May our combined light continue to guide us on our path back to wholeness and peace.

If this is your first time at a synagogue or even your first time here at Temple Emanuel, you may not know that the light hanging above the ark where the Torah scrolls are kept has been called a *ner tamid*, an everlasting light. It is a part of the architecture and religious symbolism of every Jewish sanctuary. Sometimes it is an electric light, other times it may be a flame fueled by oil. Often it is artfully crafted out of precious metal or glass. Regardless of its design, there is one thing that every *ner tamid* has in common. It is a light to be kept going at all times. It is never to be allowed to go out.

Some commentators see the *ner tamid* of our tradition not as an actual light, but as a powerful symbol representing the Jewish people. Just as the *ner tamid* burns eternally, so too the Jewish people will survive, enduring forever, despite their persecutors. Like the flame that is kindled and rekindled, the light of Judaism burns steadily.

Still, others believe that the *ner tamid* is not just a symbol of the Jewish people, but also a reminder of God's presence in our midst. Writes Rabbi Chaim Stern, "Light is a metaphor for the Divine, for understanding, for 'enlightenment...." The brightness reminds us that we are responsible for bringing God's light into the world, that we are as the prophet Isaiah said, to be "a light to all the nations." This is a universal message; each of us, Jewish or not, are responsible for bringing light into the world. Each of us is to be a "light to the nations," by offering the best of ourselves to those we love, to the members of our community and to the world around us.

It is always our task to bring light to where there is darkness. But our work has never seemed as pressing as it has during this past week. Our grief consumes us. Many of us struggle to see the light ahead. And let's be truthful: the grey Pittsburgh sky doesn't do much to lift our spirits. And yet - we know that by adding our light to the world, by being a "light to the nations," healing will begin. I don't know yet what that looks like - healing and wholeness feels far away - but I know this: when we share our light with each other, together we shine brighter. Together we can light a room or a sanctuary or even as in the story with which we began* - a great hall. Together we are a ner tamid, an eternal light, a light that will not go out. And that comforts me, and hopefully you too, knowing that all of us are in this together. It is not just the Jewish community that is grieving; all of Pittsburgh, and all of the world weeps for what has been lost. As a community, we will find our way

together, we will dispel the darkness and make sure that goodness and love and light endure. As a community, we shine so brightly. And the light coming forth from us is beautiful to behold.

*In short, it is the story of a King who tasked his three children with filling a great room with materials of their choosing. The one who completed the task to his liking would become the heir to the crown. It was the third child who won his favor, by lighting a candle in the dark hall thus filling the entire room with light.

President's Message

From David Weisberg

Safety, security, community, caring - these are the four words that best summarize for me this past month at Temple Emanuel.

I am writing this in mid-November, less than three weeks since eleven of our fellow Jews were slaughtered on Shabbat at the Tree of Life synagogue in our hometown on October 27, 2018. I have had a hard time talking about this incident without tearing up and feeling pain in my heart. This tragedy has struck many of us on a personal level but also the Jewish community across the region, country and world.

The flood of support across all faiths has been incredible. In light of this incident, I am so proud and appreciative of how the greater Pittsburgh community has voiced their intolerance for hate. They have wrapped their arms around the Jewish community, giving us a warm hug with love and caring. We at Temple Emanuel have had a great outpouring from neighborhood churches, elected officials, dignitaries and our great Mt Lebanon Police Department.

I have to recognize Chief Aaron Lauth, Deputy Chief Jason Haberman as well as their fellow Mt Lebanon police officers who provided Temple Emanuel help during this time. They have always stepped up for us, but especially now, they have been great partners and I thank them.

Temple Emanuel as well as other Pittsburgh synagogues, Jewish organizations and agencies have received tremendous backing from the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh. Brad Orsini, Director of Jewish Community Security for the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh, has lead the efforts in keeping Temple Emanuel and others apprised of developments. He along with the Mt Lebanon Police assisted Temple Emanuel in the past for security measures that we undertook. With this most recent event, Temple Emanuel has taken additional steps including having all doors being locked seven days a week with building access now on Shabbat exclusively through the locked rear ECDC entrance. Additional security actions are being undertaken with further arrangements being considered along with the associated costs. Temple Emanuel will be scheduling a meeting for congregants in order to learn steps that we as a congregation can take. Stay tuned as details are still in the works.

Finally, I would like to extend a big thank you to Leslie Hoffman during this trying time. She has taken on a large burden and has delivered. In addition, Rabbi Locketz was superb representing Temple Emanuel, including leading the beautiful Solidarity Shabbat, bringing in assistance for Torah Center families and South Hills teenagers, plus representing Temple Emanuel during the Interfaith Service at Soldiers & Sailors. With Rabbi Don being out of town and unavailable at a conference the immediate week after the tragedy, Rabbi

Locketz has been a shining star for us during this time of need. I also want to thank Iris Harlan who has worked with Leslie and Rabbi Locketz to reassure the ECDC parents during this difficult time.

So now we continue under the "new normal." I have told many of you that the most important thing is for people to feel safe and secure walking into our building. That is absolutely the priority. I have realized that I might have misspoken – the most important is the love and caring for each other both inside and outside the Temple Emanuel community who have truly poured their support and love out to us. Thank you. I am grateful. May this New Year bring peace and prosperity to all.

Within living memory, our people were plunged into deepest darkness. But we endured! The light of faith still burns brightly, and once again we see kindled the flame of freedom. Our people, Israel, have survived all who sought to destroy us. Now, through love and self-sacrifice, we labor to renew our life.



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
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
