From Rabbi Don Rossoff

I want to wish the Temple Emanuel Community a hearty YISHAR KOACH and MAZAL TOV on your choice of Rabbi Aaron Meyer as your next Senior Rabbi! I have no doubt that as time goes on, you will more and more see the wisdom of the Search Committee's recommendation of Rabbi Meyer. You – and he – are truly blessed.

Me

Congregants are usually not aware of the role of the Interim Rabbi with a Rabbinic Search Committee. The Interim Rabbi serves as an advisor to the Committee when it comes to the search process itself, but does not express an opinion about any of the candidates. When the Interim meets with the final candidates, it is not the Interim who interviews the candidate but the candidates who interview the Interim. The Interim Rabbi answers questions that the candidates have about the Temple, the role of the Rabbi, and the experience the Interim has had with the congregation. Since my experience at Temple Emanuel has been especially wonderful and meaningful, it was a joy to share my enthusiasm with the candidates.

Your new Rabbi

I was very impressed by each of the candidates because of the unique background, interests, and passion they each brought. What impressed me about Rabbi Meyer were his personable, approachable demeanor, his depth, his energy, his curiosity and creativity, his devotion to Torah, and his heartfelt passion for his sacred calling.

I cannot stay

As is typical of the experience of most interim clergy, a number of congregants have approached me with the question "Why can't you just stay?" The question is certainly personally gratifying and I take it as an expression

of appreciation. There are a number of different responses I give, but the one which I believe is most salient in this moment in the congregation's history is this: I believe I was the Rabbi you needed to help the Temple through this transitional time. I am NOT, however, the Rabbi you need to bring you into the future that the congregation desires and deserves. Rabbi Aaron is that Rabbi!

But I am still here...

You and I have but a few months left to be together. Please know that until I move on in June, I remain available to you as one of your Rabbis for conversation, consolation, and counsel.

Praying

Friday evenings are very special at Temple Emanuel. As many of you have experienced, the second Friday evening of each month has come alive with the joyous music of the new Temple Emanuel Band. And we are blessed that Janet Mostow is joining us most third and fourth Friday evenings to share her very special musical spark. I am especially excited about the two services with her this month. On February 15, our Service will be a Musical Tribute to Debbie Friedman, using Debbie's melodies and sharing personal reminiscences of a personal friend who became an international treasure. The music on February 22 will be from the Reform Tradition, i.e., tunes which many of us, myself included, grew up with in our Reform Temples. I am looking forward to a month of joyous and meaningful Shabbot!

Jewish Disabilities and Inclusion Awareness Month

While a person stamps many coins from a single die and they are all alike, God has stamped every person with the die of Adam and Eve and not one of them is like his or her fellow... (Adaptation of Sanhedrin 4:5)

Judaism teaches that in spite of being created from the same mold – b'tzelem Elohim, in God's image - each of us is unique. Sure, there are similarities; we are all human beings with physical and emotional needs. But there are differences – in the way we look, in the way we act, and most certainly, in the ways that we develop.

It is not a surprise that Pittsburgh mirrors national statistics in the number of individuals with various special needs. This includes individuals with autism, developmental disabilities, physical handicaps, and other disabilities. Each of us knows someone who is disabled; each of us loves someone who is disabled.

The traditional liturgy gives us a blessing for the wonderful diversity that exists within humankind: Baruch ata Adonai...Blessed are You, Source of Life who makes people different.

How appropriate these words are as we begin this month of February, the month designated to be the third annual Jewish Disability and Inclusion Awareness Month. In communities throughout the nation, synagogues and Jewish organizations are being encouraged to participate in programming that acknowledges our differences through the continued emphasis on inclusion for all in Jewish life, regardless of individual needs.

In the Torah Center, our 5th grade students lead the way in reminding us how much we have done here at Temple Emanuel to make our community accessible to all. And....they also remind us of how much more we have to do. I asked their teacher Kathy Ginsburg to share what happens in her class during this important unit:

"Do not place a stumbling block before the blind." I place this quote from the Torah on the board for my 5th grade Torah Students to discuss. At first, they take the quote quite literally, telling the class that it's wrong to put a rock in front of a blind person. However, sooner or later, they reason that this dictate really means more than what is suggests at first glance. Now we're getting somewhere!

"Every year around this time, we take a short break from talking about Jewish lifecycle events to discuss the Jewish perspective on disabilities and to discover all the ways we try not to place stumbling blocks before our disabled congregants and guests. We start off by learning of ways students who have disabilities can still participate in our lifecycle events, including b'nei mitzvah. Next, we tour the entire Temple, looking for ways that we have made accommodations for those who have physical and sensory challenges: ramps at the parking lot and courtyard doors, an elevator and multiple lifts that allow access to all floors of our building, handicapped stalls in the bathrooms, amplification devices for our prayer spaces and social hall, railings in the sanctuary, a ramp in the Beit HaT'fila and Braille Prayer Books and more. We also look for ways we could possibly make our Temple more disability friendly. For instance, we talk about the lack of a ramp in the main sanctuary and how that problem could possibly be solved.

"The most impactful part of our disabilities unit certainly comes when congregant Ayn Apelman visits our class. Ayn has been blind since birth and she talks to the students about life as non-sighted person. She brings her braille writer and stylus and shows the students how she reads and communicates. Ayn welcomes all questions and the students are eager to find out about her life. The students come away from this unit recognizing the importance of accommodation and a sense of how everyone can participate in Jewish life here at Temple.

This February may we take to heart the words of the Prophet Isaiah: My house shall be a house of prayer for all people (Isaiah 56:5). May we follow the example set by our students and make ourselves more aware of, and sensitive to, the needs of individuals with special needs and their families.

President's Message

From David Weisberg



As my first article of 2019, I want to share my excitement that we as a congregation are continuing on our journey to leverage our existing strengths while also looking to the future. As a point of reflection, just over two

years ago in December 2016, Rabbi Mahler announced he was going to be retiring on June 30, 2018. We celebrated and thanked him during the 2017-2018 year, which transitioned in summer 2018 as we welcomed Rabbi Don and his wife Fran into our congregation (thank you Rabbi Don!).

In spring 2018, we formed the Settled Rabbi Search Committee (SRSC), which worked tirelessly through the balance of 2018. The result was bringing Temple Emanuel a fabulous and inspirational candidate, Rabbi Aaron Meyer, to be our next Senior Rabbi.

As we look back on the search process, it was critically important for the Board of Trustees and the SRSC to first reflect and listen to the congregation. Input was solicited along the way starting with the Focus Groups and congregation survey in spring 2018 which provided us guideposts on where we as a congregation wanted to go. I am confident that we met what the congregation wanted and Temple Emanuel is well positioned for the future. The following lists of threes were on our Senior Rabbi application that was posted via the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR):

Three qualities in our new Rabbi most important to our congregation:

- 1. Warm and caring—someone who can connect with all of our congregants on an individual basis.
- Open minded and inclusive—collaborating with the diverse members of our community, as well as our staff, leadership, volunteers, and our community partners.
- 3. Inspirational—making Temple Emanuel more than just a house of worship, engaging congregants spiritually and socially.

Three most important priorities of our new Rabbi should be:

- Strengthening the relevancy of Judaism and making Temple Emanuel part of the rhythm of congregants' everyday lives.
- 2. Building relationships and connections to create *kehila kedoshah*.
- 3. Collaborating with staff, lay leadership, and other community partners.

Three primary goals of our congregation:

- 1. Become a model of audacious hospitality.
- 2. Strengthen Temple Emanuel for future generations.
- 3. Maintain our fiscal responsibility.

Three most important issues to confront in our congregation in the next five years:

- 1. Creating a strategy for Temple Emanuel to be a leading Reform congregation.
- 2. Engaging congregants throughout all stages of life.
- 3. Healing relationships and building bridges with interfaith families.

Temple Emanuel is at an inflection point. Our Board, Rabbis and staff are focused as we move ahead. These are exciting times as we continue our journey. How much fun will it be to imagine where Temple Emanuel will be two years from now?

SUNDAY BOWLING








