A CONTEMPORARY DAYEINU: IT WOULD NOT BE ENOUGH!

Here's an insert for your Seder following Dayeinu; for as much as we may have, LO DAYEINU, it is not enough. We want and need more.

Leader: We have sung our grateful DAYEINUs, declaring that that any of God's blessings in the past would have been enough. But in our day, dare we ever think that there are enough blessings to go around that no more are needed? For when we look at the world around us and see how much more is needed to build the world of which God dreams, we can only say "LO DAYEINU – It is not enough!"

Readers: Were persons of all ages, sexes, genders, races, religions, cultures, and nations to respect and appreciate one another... LO DAYEINU!

Were all children to grow up in freedom, without hunger, and with the education, resources, love and support they needed to realize their full potential... LO DAYE!NU!

Were all workers of the world to receive just compensation and respect for their labors, and enjoy safe, healthy, and secure working conditions...

LO DAYEINU!

Were governments to end the escalating production of devastating weapons, secure in the knowledge that they will not be necessary LO DAYEINU!

Were the air, water, fellow creatures, and our beautiful planet to be protected for the benefit and enjoyment of all... LO DAYEINU!

From Rabbi Jessica Locketz

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu lirdof tzedek....We praise You, Eternal our God, Ruler of the universe, who hallows us with mitzvot and commands us to pursue justice.

These words of blessing framed the four day weekend of learning, togetherness and fun I recently attended in Washington DC along with four of our tenth grade Confirmation students. We had a great time – our trip included a visit to the Holocaust Museum, the Martin Luther King, Jr. and Jefferson Memorials, time to see one of the Smithsonian museums on the National Mall, a day on Capital Hill visiting the offices of our Senators and Congressional Representative – there was so much to do!

Our Temple Emanuel group along with students and rabbis from other Pittsburgh Reform Congregations (Rodef Shalom, Temple Sinai and Temple David) went to Washington to participate in a Bernard and Audre Rapoport L'Taken Social Justice Seminar, a program focusing on Jewish values and social justice run by the Religious Action Center (RAC), the Reform Movement's lobbying arm in our nation's capital. It was definitely a weekend to remember!

Our students joined with over 300 other Reform teens from across the country to learn how to advocate for what is important to them and to learn how to use Judaism to help speak out against injustice and wrongdoing. They prepared to lobby by learning about legislative bills that will hopefully be introduced in the next Congress and wrote speeches to present during the lobby visits so that their voices could be heard. They chose to talk about Gun Violence Prevention, Climate Change, and the Equality Act (providing equal opportunity regardless of sexual orientation and gender identification). I am very proud of them and the hard work that they did. They conducted themselves as any good lobbyists would – with confidence and maturity.

Without a doubt, it was a great experience... for the students who really bonded as a group and for me too. This was my twelfth time participating as a chaperone. Every time I go, I am honored to participate in this important program. It is a busy weekend; as a chaperone I am expected to do a lot. For starters, I am there to ensure the safety of our students. But I am also there to participate in worship - I was honored to read Torah at the Shabbat morning service - and to help facilitate workshops and programs. This is perhaps my favorite part of the weekend, the opportunity to learn a lot as I prepare to lead discussions and sessions. One of the workshops I helped to lead this year was on the Equality Act, a bill that if passed, would amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to prohibit discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity in employment, housing, public accommodations, public education, federal funding, credit, and the jury system. Part of the learning focused on texts related to better understanding the verse from Genesis 1:27 - God created humankind in God's image, in the image of God, God created them; male and female God

created them as a call for all of us to see the divine in each other, and to treat each other accordingly. It became clear to me during the discussion that when we talk about LGBTQ+ issues, the words we use are important; our word choice can determine our level of support or our ignorance. A glossary was handed out that I would like to share, especially in light of the hard work our LGBTQ+ Task Force is putting into making sure that Temple is a home for all of us. So here it is – by no means an exhaustive list. But it's a good start! See page 4 for Glossary of Terms.



Glossary of Terms: The Basics

Sexual orientation An individual's physical or emotional attraction to the same and/or a different sex. Sexual orientations include—but are not limited to—lesbian, gay, bisexual, asexual and heterosexual. Avoid the offensive term "sexual preference," which suggests that being gay or lesbian is a choice and changeable.

Gender Identity

A person's inner understanding of the gender(s) to which they belong or with which they identify. This is each person's unique knowing or feeling, and is separate from a person's physical body or appearance (although often related). Since gender identity is internal, one's gender identity is not necessarily visible to others.

LGBTQ

An acronym that stands for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning.

Gay

A person who is attracted to people of the same sex (e.g. gay men and lesbians)

Lesbian

A woman whose primary attraction is to other women.

Bisexual

An individual who is romantically and physically attracted to both men and women.

Asexual

The lack of a sexual attraction or desire for other people.

Gender Expression How a person represents or expresses one's gender identity to others, often through behavior, clothing,

hairstyles, voice or body characteristics.

Transgender

A term for people whose gender identity, expression or behavior is different from those typically associated with their assigned sex at birth. Transgender is a broad term and is good for cisgender people to use. "Trans" is shorthand for "transgender." Note that transgender is an adjective (i.e. use the phrase "a transgender person" NOT "a transgender) and transgender<u>ed</u> and transgender<u>s</u> are not words.

Gender Non-Conforming A term for individuals whose gender expression is different from societal expectations related to gender.

Cisgender

Transsexual

A term for people whose gender, expression or behavior is the same as those typically associated with their assigned sex at birth.

An older term for people whose gender identity is different from their assigned sex at birth who seeks to transition from male to female or female to male. Many do not prefer this term because it is thought to sound overly clinical, so the best practice is to use the word transgender.

FTM (AKA transgender man)

A person who transitions from "female-to-male," meaning a person who was assigned female at birth, but identifies and lives as a male. Also known as a "transgender man."

MTF (AKA Transgender women)

A person who transitions from "male-to-female," meaning a person who was assigned male at birth, but identifies and lives as a female. Also known as a "transgender woman."

Intersex A term used for people who are born with a reproductive or sexual anatomy and/or chromosome pattern that does not seem to fit typical definitions of male or female.

Cross Dressing

A term for people who dress in clothing traditionally or stereotypically worn by the other sex, but who generally have no intention of living full-time as the other gender. The older term "transvestite" is considered derogatory by many in the United States. Cross-dresser should NOT be used to describe someone who has transitioned to live full-time as another sex, or who intends to do so in the future. Cross-dressing is a form of gender expression but is not necessarily tied to gender identity or sexual orientation.

Queer

An umbrella term used to refer to people who are not heterosexual and/or not cisgender. Queer was once widely used in a negative way but has been reclaimed by some members of the LGBT movement. However, some people still consider it offensive.

Best practice: when referring to a <u>specific</u> person's sexual orientation or gender identity, always use the term that <u>they</u> identify with; never label someone with a sexual orientation or gender identity that they may not identify with.



A Temple Emanuel Exhibit goes to France — and then to the City

On Pearl Harbor Day, I fell out of bed while dreaming and banged my head on the hard oak frame of our bed, producing post concussion symptoms which were slow to dissipate. The accident caused me to forgo an invitation to France to attend the official opening of a French version of the exhibit "Who is a Jew?"

Some congregants may have seen "Who is a Jew?" in the Thou Art Gallery of Temple where it is still on display. As for the French version entitled "Etre Juif dans la Somme, 1940-1945" that exhibit which opened at the new University of Picardy Library in Amiens on January 8, 2019 and ran through February 20, enabled the photo ID cards of the Jews to actually be viewed in the city and territory where this particular part of the tragedy unfolded. How, I wondered, would the sight of the faces of Jews from that region, many of whom had been deported to death camps during the German Occupation, be received? Would it prompt discussion about the co-responsibility of France and some French for the Shoah? And how would it be viewed against the background of the rising tide of anti-Semitism currently? Recently I received a scan of the guest book for the exhibit with visitors' comments. One person wrote: "Terrifyingly concrete! It was in my street (rue de la Contrescarpe) my village (Quevauviller); it was yesterday...and at the same time a bit today." The mayor of Amiens wrote "This period is so far away....and so near. How is it possible? Why such hatred? We are left with no words..."

The Holocaust Center of Pittsburgh is currently adapting "Who is a Jew?" to its mission, focused on students in the Pittsburgh schools. The opening of "Rediscovering the Jews of Amiens" will take place on April 15, 2019 at 7 p.m. I would like to thank Temple Emanuel and the Adult Ed Committee for helping launch this initiative.
