From Rabbi Don Rossoff

Beginning with an Ending and Ending with a Beginning

Last Yom Kippur, I shared my understanding of transitions, how they begin with an ending and end with a beginning.

And now, as predicted, my time at Temple is beginning to come to an end, and with that ending comes the beginning of your journey with Rabbi Aaron Meyer. Temple Emanuel is so very blessed to have engaged such a Rabbi! Let me just say that I have met no rabbis more dynamic, learned, thoughtful, principled, perceptive, caring, and dedicated as he.

But as many blessings Rabbi Aaron brings, I also have to point out that he is not a messiah who will immediately fulfill everyone's expectations for Temple. That's OK, since we Reform Jews do not believe in the coming of a messiah anyway. Long ago, we rejected the idea that one individual could single-handedly make everything right in the world. Instead, Reform Jews envision a messianic era, an increasingly better world, the creation of which is a shared enterprise of persons of vision and good will. As the saying goes, "He can't, but we can!"

And so it is as a shared enterprise that Temple Emanuel stands at the cusp of an exciting new era. This wonderful new stage in the Temple's great history will be brought about over time through Rabbi Aaron's leadership as he works in partnership with Rabbi Locketz, the Temple's dedicated staff and lay leadership, and caring members of the congregation. Together in *shutafut*, sacred partnership, they – YOU – will create and implement the new and forward-leaning mission and vision which the Temple needs and the community deserves. As the prophet Jeremiah proclaimed long ago, "There is hope for your future!"

As you begin this journey with your new Senior Rabbi, I hope you keep in mind something else I shared in the fall: *kol hatchalot kashot*; all beginnings are difficult. I said then that "it takes time – a few years even - for a new Rabbi to get to know, understand, and grow into a new congregation and make it his or her own. It takes patience and time for a congregation to get to know, appreciate, and grow into a new Rabbi and make her or him its own. Trust, confidence, connection, and affection take time to take root." I am deeply grateful to Rabbi Jessica Locketz for her partnership, her commitment to Torah, and her hard work; to Leslie Hoffman for her wisdom and dedication; to Iris Harlan for her enthusiasm and caring, to Linda Frankel for her support and loyalty as rabbinic assistant, and to the rest of the wonderful staff, Lori, Barb, Paula S, Paula A, Ellen, Melinda, Steve, Chuck, Linda, for the many things they do which help make Temple Emanuel such a special place to be. Thanks as well to our talented professional musicians, Dr. Chuck Cohen, Jim Burns, and Janet Mostow with whom it has been a pleasure to worship.

My deep thanks goes to President David Weisberg whose steady and astute leadership has been the foundation of a successful year of transition. I am grateful for his service to Temple and for the friendship we have shared. I am grateful as (Cont'd. on page 3)

I. Make an effort to celebrate Shabbat more fully. There are a lot of worship opportunities during these next few months! On the first Friday of June (at 6:30 pm) we will honor the Rossoffs and thank them for a great year as we wish them well on their next endeavor. The second Friday (at 7:30 pm) is our Pride Shabbat. Don't miss this opportunity to celebrate diversity and honor our LGBTQ+ community. The third week (Picnic at 5:45, Services at 6:30 pm) we will be returning to Bird Park for an outdoor service followed by S'MORES! Please join us for these special services.

Or come to Temple during the weeks following to be a part of our services on Friday evenings at 6:30 pm (especially for the July 6th TERMS Shabbat) or our beautiful Shabbat morning services at 10:20 am on Saturday morning. Looking for a good discussion? Come to Torah study here at Temple (Saturdays, 9 am) or talk about it at home...look to http://www.reformjudaism.org/learning/torah-study for guidance. Or take advantage of less hectic days and plan family time on Shabbat; whether hiking, biking, eating, studying (more on this in a bit!), watching movies or just enjoying each other's company, summer can be a great time to establish family Shabbat traditions.

II. Catch up on your Jewish reading. There are just so many great books to read! And many of them have Jewish themes. Visit the library here at Temple – our librarian, Paula Altschul can certainly point interested readers in the right direction! The URJ (Union of Reform Judaism) has also made some recommendations.

Go to your favorite app store and search for Jewish News – and choose the apps for newspapers, magazines, bible translations, books, etc. that interest you.

Prefer to listen rather than read? Venture into the world of podcasts with the many options available at http://www.reformjudaism.org/learning/podcasts. Or follow Judaism Unbound (remember last month's awesome Sajowitz Endowment Fund speaker?!) at https://www.judaismunbound.com/.

III. Help your kids to remember what they learned in their Torah Center classes. Review the alef-bet with them, or (if you don't have school aged children, or even if you do!) learn it for yourself! Need materials? Don't hesitate to call the Education Office here at Temple. We are happy to provide workbooks designed for home use, and links for online resources. Additionally, there are a few websites that can help. For starters, go to http://www.reformjudaism.org/jewish-life/family for ideas. And, make sure to visit http://www.behrmanhouse.com/family and create a family account. Once that is done, there are multiple resources that can be accessed to help with Hebrew

learning and review. With a little practice, you'll be ready for our adult Hebrew class in the fall! Another great website for younger kids: https://www.bimbam.com/kids-family/. For older kids, check out the videos on http://www.g-dcast.com/. You will be laughing so hard your kids (and you too!) won't even realize that they are learning! Additionally, look at

Realizing Our Hopes Together



More than 5 million unique individuals visit the Western Wall, the retaining wall of the Second Temple in Jerusalem considered a sacred site in Judaism, every year. Many bring with them small notes, containing wishes or prayers, that they deposit in the crevices of these ancient stones. I distinctly

remember the ardent petition that I left on my first trip to Israel and hope that you have also had — or will have soon! — the chance to participate in this meaningful ritual.

Have you ever wondered what happens to these millions of notes? They can't remain in the wall forever, lest the prayers and desires of future travelers not be granted space, but they are considered holy within Jewish tradition and must be treated accordingly. Twice each year, before Rosh HaShana and Passover, these notes are collected by teams of people wielding tiny sticks designed to dislodge the notes without degrading the Herodian stones. The notes are then collected for burial on the Mount of Olives, the same treatment bestowed upon a well-loved Torah scroll. Finally, the head rabbi (the site is treated as an ultra-Orthodox synagogue, complete with a robust clergy team, which helps to explain some of the friction surrounding pluralistic prayer at the Western Wall) offers a prayer that each of the notes' wishes be fulfilled as new notes come to take their place.

I love this imagery as a metaphor for transition. The Reform Movement long ago removed prayers for a rebuilt Temple — and corresponding return to animal sacrifice — from our liturgy, recognizing each of our houses of worship as modernday temples. Our sacred site is Temple Emanuel, where God's presence can be felt as strongly as in Jerusalem. Many unique individuals, including congregants, guests, and community members, continue to bring with them wishes and prayers deposited through their thoughts, words, and actions. This became manifest in Temple's "Wish Poem Project" and exemplified in numerous innovation workshops, where so many were able to contribute their vision for Temple's future, and it continues to this day. We have now come to an inflection point, when it feels like the anticipation for these hopes is tangible.

My task, like that of the rabbi at the Western Wall, is to strive to bring about the fulfillment of these wishes and prayers. I hope to do so with inquisitive questions and listening ear rather than a stick, but the goal is the same: to bring each individual's desires out from the cracks and into the public square. Rather than bury these holy hopes, however, I endeavor to explore each one with its author and to be your partner in bringing them to fruition. It is a process that will take some time and I am eager to get started. Please join me this summer for Shabbat services and the many opportunities planned to get to know one another. Chances to connect one-on-one are also important to me, and I share the following link

so that you can set up an appointment from the convenience of your smart phone or computer: calendly.com/rabbimeyer.

Together we stand on sacred ground, in awe of the work and legacy of those who have gone before us and ready to bring about the realization of so many wishes and prayers. I'm excited to begin!

COMING TO TERMS 10th ANNIVERSARY EDITION



Ten years ago Ed Friedman, Bob Konig, Barry Roos*, and Harvey Rubin, met to establish a retiree group. That group, now known as TERMS (Temple Emanuel Retirees in Mitzvah Service) has remained active since its inception.

Howard Myers kicked off preparations for our 10 year anniversary by donating T-shirts for TERMS members to wear at all events we support. **Marie Levine** designed the TERMS logo shown above.

Our vision Is: To support our Temple's needs, while enriching our own lives through the mitzvahs we perform and the friendships we develop amongst our teammates and the Temple family we serve. The twin goals of maintaining a strong team spirit while taking personal ownership for the mitzvahs we perform lie at the center of that vision. Some of our activities during the past year are outlined below.

Our sixth annual TERMS Shabbat was held on July 6, 2018. We were honored to have Interim Rabbi Don Rossoff spend his first official Temple Emanuel Shabbat with us. Our special Shabbat services would not have been possible without the active involvement of Rabbi Mahler, and many TERMS members.

Seventeen TERMS members hosted **our ninth annual Memorial Day Bagel Brunch** for over 120 attendees. As in previous years, the Bagel Brunch was free, the costs defrayed by a 50/50 raffle.

TERMS members Roger Liss, Will Joseph, Ron Richards, and Alan Schorr helped the Men of Temple Emanuel (MOTE) construct the Temple's Sukkah.

TERMS Members **Carol and Byron Rose and Lynn and Harvey Rubin** were honored on April 30th at the city-wide celebration for participants in the new **Legacy Giving program.**

Carol Rose orchestrated two separate meals prepared by TERMS for Miryam's Place, a shelter for homeless women.

Carol also coordinates Miriam's Place meals prepared by other Temple Emanuel teams.

During the past year, **Ed and Roz Friedman added new materials to the Temple Emanuel Library Archives.** They contain an array of materials dating from Temple's inception in 1951 to the present. They also maintained documentation to describe the archives' contents. This project is an ongoing effort to update and maintain the Temple archives on a continuing basis.

TERMS members also supported a wide range of Temple events including the Labor Day Picnic and ushering at the High Holiday Services; Lynn and Harvey Rubin, Will Joseph, Georgia Kent and Howard Myers worked to keep the Holocaust Garden beautiful; Roberta Carr and Penny Abrams regularly helped the office with monthly malling of the Temple Bulletin; Roberta also volunteered in the Temple Gift Shop.

All work and no play is no fun, so **Carol and Byron Rose** hosted our **Ninth Annual** *TERMS'* **Active Member Party**, a Yom Kippur break-the-fast, at their home.

Where do we go from here? That's up to our TERMS members...old and new...and a continuing flow of new assignments for us to undertake. If the past is any indication, our future is unlimited... both in the number of active members we attract (membership is open to the men and women of Temple Emanuel who are retirees, or plan on retirement in the coming year), and the number of exciting projects we agree to undertake.






