A MESSAGE FROM RABBI AARON MEYER

"I am at the Seder, but my heart is in October" writes 2020 Sajowitz Scholar-in-Residence Rabbi Menachem Creditor. "Centuries ago, the Spanish Jewish poet Yehuda Halevi expressed both his sense of distance from, and connection to, the land of his ancestors: 'My heart is in the East, and I am in the furthermost West.' Many of us feel similarly today, in terms of both space and time. Months have passed, but for many Jews around the world, the traumatic events of October 7 feel ever present — and in Israel this sense is even more acute. Many of us in the Diaspora feel the emotional connection to Israel, as well as the physical distance, as much as ever. We are here, but our hearts are there. And we are at the seder, but our hearts are still in shiv'vah b'October — which can mean both 'the 7th of October' and 'the shiva [mourning period] of October.'" So begins his new work, in partnership with Dr. Ora Horn Prouser of the Academy for Jewish Religion, Seder Interrupted: A Post October 7 Haggadah Supplement.

More than seven months have passed since the Hamas terrorist attack of October 7th, 2023, yet Israel — and even the United States — continues to reel from the aftermath of that horrific day. Those in the Jewish community who don't believe we should be openly critical of Israel and those loudly calling for new elections alike suffer under the rise and antisemitism gripping college campuses, county councils, and public sentiment in every country in which Jews live. We gather at our Passover seder table this year with friends and family, Jews and non-Jews, people with whom we politically agree and those with whom we definitely don't, in a starkly different cultural milieu than last year. With serious questions about what it means to be a free people in our own land, in any land. With concerns about how we responsibly share the freedoms we have been granted. With a better understanding of fear and escape.

What questions will you add to the traditional Four Questions to recognize the challenges of our day? Perhaps you might ask "In what ways does this Passover night feel different from other Passover nights?" Or "How can we avoid the hardened heart that so plagued Pharaoh?" Or perhaps "Is there room for an olive on our seder plate?"


What readings will you bring to challenge yourself and your guests not to become complacent? Perhaps you might share the words of Chen Artzi Saror: "One must see oneself as one who came out of Be'eri. Out of K'far Aza. Out of S'derot. Out of Ofakim. Remember and do not forget until the final day. Not to see more fear: but to ready our hope." Or the words of Rabbi Dan Orenstein: "Israel was severely traumatized by the toxic, religiously-fueled hatred and rage of Hamas. Our people rightly responded with a rage born of deep vulnerability and a steadfast refusal to let such barbarity go unpunished. Yet, to paraphrase Robert Frost, 'rage leads onto rage.' So much suffering and destruction fueled by hate and deep mistrust are bleeding Jews and Palestinians to death, in different yet equally poisonous ways. The chametz of anger and hopelessness is bloating our two peoples to the point where we risk exploding." Or perhaps the words of Pirkei Avot 4:1: "Who is strong? One who can subdue his/her/their inclinations."

What you add — to your Haggadah, to your discussions, to your understandings of history's past and the obligations of the present — builds upon a long tradition of seeing ourselves in the Passover narrative. New haggadot were written to reflect the experience of the Chalutzim, those who made the deserts of Israel bloom. New haggadot were written to reflect the Soviet Jewish experience of escape and the American Jewish experience of relative acceptance. New haggadot are being written by our experiences and our diversity as a Jewish community, for we are commanded to see ourselves as if we, personally, had gone forth from Egypt. From trauma and fear to revelation and responsibility. From October 7, 2023 to the world we so desperately need.

A MESSAGE FROM TEMPLE PRESIDENT, MICHELLE MARKOWITZ

Creating a More Flexible and Inclusive Temple Emanuel

The future of Temple Emanuel requires a shift toward centering the community and its diverse, evolving needs. Temple's Vision and Mission remain unchanged - <u>Living, Learning, and Leading Judaism</u>. What will change is how we do that.



We have centered two goals in our work - Vibrancy and Financial Solvency and are focusing on three ways to achieve these goals:

- Belonging Make it easier for any person with a connection to Temple's mission to feel a sense of belonging by shifting from an organization with a formal membership structure to one that creates unlimited pathways for belonging.
- 2. **Responding** Create the conditions for a nimble and responsive organization that serves both the broader community as well as the immediate needs of those closest to Temple through empowering staff to listen to the community and respond to its needs.
- 3. **Giving** Inspire giving from all who feel a sense of belonging to, responsibility for, and connection with Temple by calling on them to contribute in accordance with the alignment between their individual values, the mission of Temple, their means, and the actual costs to serve the community.

What's next? While we continue to build out what implementation of these goals will look like, you can expect more opportunities for open dialogue between staff, lay leaders, and all of you. We are also anticipating a congregational vote on amendments to the bylaws in the fall of 2024.

A MESSAGE FROM CANTOR KALIX JACOBSON

Last month, I travelled out to Edison, NJ for a program a year and a half in the making. I was visiting the community of Temple Emanu-El in Edison to correct a wrong that had endured for nearly 50 years. In 1964, Temple Emanu-El in Edison hired a woman named Susan Rosenthal, who soon married and became Susan Mandell, as their cantor. Susan was well loved as their cantor and set a precedent with her presence as clergy at Temple Emanu-El—every single cantor they have ever hired since they were founded in 1961 has been a woman. And I think that is precisely the reason why Susan was largely forgotten. Susan made it look normal, even expected, to have women on the Bimah at her congregation. She hired female replacements while she was away, and even inspired two female students that ended up becoming cantors due to her influence. However, Susan was different than every other woman cantor that Temple Emanu-El hired—she wasn't ordained or invested. In fact, other than her lifelong involvement in Conservative synagogues, she had no formal training as a cantor.

In 1964, when Susan began to work at the congregation, no woman had been ordained or invested as a rabbi or cantor in the United States. Susan did something that just a few women had done before her, and in total isolation. She was unaware of the two women who came before her as non-invested or ordained cantors, and she was unaware of other women who were leaders in songleading and performance spaces. Songleaders like Debbie Friedman and Hazentes (performance cantors) like Freydele Oysher were not official clergy or service leaders. Susan was official clergy (albeit without the typical legal status of clergy)—she led services, wrote cantorial music for herself, officiated life cycle events (including the b'nei mitzvahs and weddings of her four children), and was a pillar of the New Jersey Jewish community. Only one other woman in the United States that we know of was doing this work in the 1960s when she began. That other woman, Betty Robbins, was and is well remembered. Susan, by and large, was forgotten until now.

I found Susan in a newspaper archive in 2022 while I was doing thesis research. After doing some more digging, I was astonished to find her alive and well in Boca Raton, Florida, nearly 50 years since anything had been published about her cantorate. When I realized her synagogue was where my friend Cantor Emily Simkin was currently the cantor, I gave her a call to ask if she knew anything about Susan. She did not, and dozens of conversations over about a year led to this Scholar in Residency last month. I got to participate in and witness not only incredible conversations about being a woman cantor in a time before women were formally trained, but also listen to Susan lead her first service at Temple Emanu-El in 46 years. So often, women do incredible things, are promptly forgotten, and then rediscovered long after they are dead—this happened to the first woman cantor, Julie Rosewald, who was rediscovered in 2010 by Judith Pinnolis, long after she died. I am very thankful that I managed to find her still alive and well so she could be celebrated in life.

Spring is a joyful and busy time at ECDC! As we return to school from our Spring Break, the days seem to accelerate as our time with our students draws to a close for the summer. It makes me especially grateful for the joyful routines of the school year-the Shabbat celebrations, the Friday Assemblies, and marking holidays throughout the year. Just before we left for break, ECDC celebrated Purim. There was a very sweet moment during one of our recent grade level Shabbat services where I was sitting near a student during one of the prayers they have not yet learned. The student tapped me on the shoulder, pointed in their prayerbook to the word containing the root for the Hebrew word "holy". He was so excited to have spotted it in an unfamiliar prayer and then proceeded to tap both mom and dad on their shoulders to share too. Moments like this are what we strive for. Where the learning that happens within the walls of the classroom extends into their real life. Where the students on their own discover that what they are learning can help them find meaning in prayers they may not know and that they not only have the decoding skills to read the prayer, they have the grammar and vocabulary skills to pick out key words to further their understanding.

As I write this, we have only 4 weeks of classes for Torah Center to go. Reflecting on the 23-24 school year, I am so incredibly proud of our students, faculty, and madrichim for what they have accomplished this year. I hope the spring into summer is filled with moments such as the one above, where the learning extends beyond the classroom and our students and families continue to experience these connecting moments.
