A MESSAGE FROM RABBI AARON MEYER

Three New Things

At the end of the Torah Center year, when our youngest scholars are gathered for a closing assembly before heading out in the summer sunshine, I challenge them to do three new things:

Read a new book. Make a new friend. Have a new experience.

These three things are as applicable for us as adults as for our young people. Let me explain:

Read a new book. During our South Hills Shavuot study with our friends at Beth El, I shared a text from Pirkei Avot 1:3 - "Antigonus a man of Socho received the oral tradition from Shimon the Righteous. He used to say: do not be like servants who serve the master in the expectation of receiving a reward, but be like servants who serve the master without the expectation of receiving a reward, and let the awe of Heaven be upon you." One of my favorite ways to understand this verse in the modern era is that we should embrace learning for its own sake. So often we are asked to read something by others — for a work assignment, for a school assignment, to stay up-to-date in this troubled world — that we might not choose to read if left to our own devices. Doing so can be important...but it often takes the joy out of reading. Hopefully, maybe, your summer schedule slows enough that you can read for just the fun of it. A silly novel well-suited for the beach. A bit of history you have always wanted to explore. A new biography or something to better understand our world. My summer read? The New Media Editor for the Times of Israel, Sarah Tuttle-Singer writes in Jerusalem Drawn and Quartered: "This is Jerusalem in all its layers. It's complicated and it's messy and it's gorgeous, too." Whatever you choose to read, reading for it's own sake — true Torah lishmah — is good for the soul.

Make a new friend. This one feels *hard* when you are an adult and not necessarily meeting new people at summer camp or at the swimming pool anymore. Perhaps we might expand the category to be "have an enriching conversation with a new person where you aren't trying to change their mind." To make a new friend, to have an enriching conversation, is to enter into a process of give and take: caring about others and in turn seeing if they care about you. When we ask questions and seek to understand and genuinely care about another person, we enrich their lives along with our own. Proverbs 10:12 points out that holding hate or disagreement in our heart only allows us to see the bad while love lets us assume the best. Assume the best for a conversation with a stranger or acquaintance and see where it goes. Perhaps it leads to a singular positive interaction, a good in-and-of-itself, or perhaps it expands the circle of people who care more about others in this world.

Have a new experience. Lather, rinse, repeat is not only the slogan on the back of our shampoo bottles but an insight into our daily lives. We become comfortable in certain patterns of behavior, whether good for us or not, that we tend to frequently repeat. Hopefully summertime allows us to try something new. Is it time to get back up on that literal bicycle to try out a new trail? Maybe we are fortunate to travel this summer, visiting a new city and trying a new food. Maybe our new experience is a push beyond our comfort zone or maybe its exactly what we enjoy. To keep trying new things — while reading new books and meeting new people — is to keep growing as a person, striking the ultimate hopeful position: who we are now is not the best we can be.

I don't know if our Torah Center students will listen to this advice. I don't know if you will, either, but I do think the summer offers us a rare chance and opportunity: to try new things. May those things enrich your summer as a salve for hurting hearts and as an antidote to the challenges of this world.



A MESSAGE FROM CANTOR KALIX JACOBSON

Happy Pride Month, Temple Family!

Think back to when you were young for a moment. Did you have someone to look up to? Someone who was like you? Maybe someone who was different in a way you also were—a Jewish teacher in your public school with very few Jews, or a leader in your community who grew up without financial security in a way with which you resonated. We hear about it all the time in 2024: representation matters. Representation has always mattered. During the rollout of the Disney movie "The Princess and the Frog," I remember just how excited my black classmates were to have a black Disney princess. This feeling is inherent and visceral to the human experience—we want to belong. It is exciting and validating as a human being to see yourself represented in the world around you.

We as Jews are blessed to have figures from our history that run the gambit of human experiences. Perhaps we see ourselves in Moses, who had a stutter. Was Moses disqualified from being our greatest prophet because he had a disability? Nope! G-d provided an accommodation through Moses's brother Aaron to save the Israelites from slavery. Maybe we see ourselves in Abraham and Sarah, who were unable to have children for most of their marriage. Even with this struggle with infertility, they managed to bring about a nation that outnumbered the stars in the sky. Or maybe we see ourselves in Ruth, who lost everything she cared about in life and still decided to follow Naomi, her mother-in-law. At this moment of despair, she declared that Naomi's G-d will be her G-d, becoming the first convert to Judaism.

This past weekend, I spent time at the Temple Emanuel booth at Lebo Pride, which meant a lot to me personally. Pride has always been very important to me as a member of the LGBTQ+ community. When I came out in 2008, there were no grown-ups that were like me that I personally knew. Because of this, I didn't know what life would be like as a queer adult. Nothing was guaranteed to me. Fast forward to 2024, and I am often blessed to watch the expression of a young person who sees me and realizes I am "like them," as happened often on Saturday. It is one of the great gifts of my cantorate. Those videos were right—it got better. And I get to give the gift of better to the next generation.

This year, I am starting a new initiative through Temple Emanuel to create spaces for families involved in the LGBTQ+ community, and for LGBTQ+ adults who are looking for other likeminded individuals to commune with. My hope is to create spaces for people who care about Jewish values and LGBTQ+ community, and to create space for them to be themselves. This Pride month, I invite you to be proud of whatever makes you, you. According to our tradition, we are all made in the divine image. Own it!

A MESSAGE FROM TEMPLE EMANUEL'S BOARD PRESIDENT, BETH SCHWARTZ

I am writing this as Temple Emanuel's next President. This is an honor and commitment that I do not take lightly. I stand on the shoulders of all those who have come before, and as Temple Emanuel stands on the precipice of significant change, moving into the future of synagogue-based Judaism.

Temple Emanuel holds a place near and dear to my family, three generations strong. When my in-laws moved to the South Hills in the early 1970s, they joined Temple Emanuel and became active members – active with their time and financial commitment, making sure Temple was strong and thriving. My husband Matt grew up here and then left Pittsburgh for college and graduate school. When we returned to PIttsburgh in the late 1990s, we quickly joined Temple. We had every intention of being actively involved as our Jewish identities were important to us, and we looked to Temple Emanuel as a place that I could connect, and Matt could reconnect, into the Pittsburgh community.

As we created our family, our children grew up here. Through Torah for Tots (now known as KIDdish Club), and Temple Emanuel Nursery School (now called ECDC), Temple Emanuel became Rebecca and Anna's second home. (Rebecca and Anna actually accompanied me to several board meetings in utero and as infants as this is actually my second stint on the Board). Temple Emanuel is where we raised our family, attending nursery school and then Torah Center programs, worship services, Labor Day and Memorial Day picnics, social action events and other activities too numerous to name. It is where we have lived out our Jewish values, and made many of our dearest friends.

It is my ardent hope that I will help lead Temple Emanuel into its bright future, keeping Temple a place for future generations to have the same wonderful experiences my family has had. My favorite times at Temple are when we have multiple activities happening simultaneously - When I arrive for the "regular" Shabbat service as the cacophony of young voices and laughter of KIDdish Club fill the building; when Torah Center, Sunday Minyan and a Caring Community cooking activity overlap. I also experience Temple's vibrancy at activities such as our recent Memorial Day picnic when some of our youngest and our most senior community members are gathered together enjoying the same space.

Our Steering Committee and our Board have been hard at work in for the past 2 years developing a model that we believe will provide for Temple Emanuel's future financial solvency and community vibrancy. This new model involves paradigm shifts in our membership, governance and financial operations which we believe will enable Temple Emanuel to sustain ourselves into the future. These paradigm shifts can be scary and daunting as we are changing the way things have always been done. But if we don't change and adapt Temple Emanuel to the changing society in which we live, Temple will not remain the thriving place we want it to be in the future.

A MESSAGE FROM

IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT MICHELLE MARKOWITZ

(Adapted from President's speech at Temple Emanuel's Annual Congregational Meeting on June 2nd)

I want to take this opportunity to share with all of you some of the words I shared, including a strategy update and a host of well-deserved thank yous, with those who were able to attend and watch Temple's 2024 Annual Meeting.

Strategy Update: As you hopefully know by this point, in the spring of 2022, Temple began embarking on a transformational change process with our partners at Outside Angle. We embarked on this effort because our current financial model cannot sustain us into the future. We chose to do this now, and not wait, because we are sustainable in the very near term....but as a Board, it is our responsibility to ensure long-term sustainability. I can't imagine a change process more difficult than one where there is no clear vision of where you're going and no available model upon which to create it. Through a lot of perseverance, the Board of Trustees earlier this spring voted to move forward with a vision for Temple that centers our mission and our community and focuses on the goals of increased vibrancy and ongoing financial sustainability as our north stars. Based on what we heard from all of you, the Board adopted moving forward with shifts in three areas - Membership, Governance, and Finances. I am thrilled to report our current staff is ready to develop a plan to begin implementing these changes, and while you will hear more about all of them, I also want to let you know that later this calendar year, on the Jewish Calendar schedule of "after the holidays," there will be a Congregational Vote to modify our bylaws to implement the Governance shift. There will be much more to come on this effort. I am so excited for where this community is going.

Thank you to Outgoing Board Members Tracy Barnett, Nate Eisinger, Kathy Ginsburg, Alicia Kozel, Sarah Levinthal, and Chuck Silverstein: Being a member of the Temple Emanuel Board of Trustees is not exactly glamorous. You read emails, you attend meetings, sometimes you're asked to make hard decisions, and hopefully you feel like your contributions mattered. I had the opportunity to honor each of you individually at our meeting last week, but what I want to say in front of the congregation as a whole is this: With certainty each of your contributions mattered. Thank you for reading those emails, even the long ones, thank you for attending those meetings, participating in those discussions and making those decisions. Temple would not be here without you, and as I mentioned on Tuesday, you're always welcome back. Thank you.

Thank you to the Board: I'll repeat once again what I said on Tuesday night so everyone can hear it. Temple does not take for granted the time and dedication it takes out of the many other things you can be doing and are doing in your lives to being part of this effort. When I say we can't do it without you, I mean that literally. Thank you.

Thank you to Staff: I am so glad this community already got to hear how amazing each and everyone of you is already this morning. The easy (and short) thing for me to do at this point is to say "ditto." You are each amazing and this community is so fortunate for the dedication, care, and time each of you puts into Temple to make sure this community is the community it is. I do need to offer a special thanks to my partners in crime – Rabbi Aaron Meyer and Leslie Hoffman. We have spent a lot of time together – both virtually and in person – over these last 4 years. I can only hope you enjoyed that time as much as I did. Leslie – I already had the chance to thank you at your "retirement" last fall, and I am not sure if all of Mt. Lebanon heard the huge sigh of relief all of us breathed when you were willing to help us out once again during this transitional time. You truly saved the day and our gratitude knows no bounds. Congregational Highlights

- We celebrated Cantor Kalix's installation as our first full-time cantor in nearly 50 years.
- We developed a strategic plan with our consulting partner Outside Angle.
- We updated our Holocaust Memorial Garden thanks to a grant from the David R. and Frances F. Levin Charitable Foundation.
- We hired Rebecca Closson to be a full-time staff member as our new Finance Development and Relationship Director.

Membership & Support

- 26 new families joined Temple Emanuel!
- · Current membership 466 member families
- \$606,610 dues collected as of June 18, 2024
- Total fundraising of \$132,150!

Education & Adult Learning

- Adult learners engaged in a Hebrew class during the fall.
- Our Adult B'Nei Mitzvah cohort is preparing for their B'Nei Mitzvah in the fall.
- ECDC's Reggio Emilia-inspired preschool welcomed 120 children and families from the Temple Emanuel community and beyond. Our active Parent-Teacher Partnership offered programs such as Parent's Night Out, a clothing swap, morning yoga, and story times at local libraries.
- Torah Center welcomed 91 students preK-7th grade from 62 families.
- 34 high school students from Temple Emanuel and Beth El joined us on Sundays for our High School Program.
- 28 madrichim helped teachers and students.
- 7th grade students & parents visited the Holocaust Museum in Washington DC with Rabbi Aaron and Cantor Kalix.
- 12 students joined Rabbi Aaron and Kathy Ginsburg for L'Taken, RAC's advocacy trip for teens.

Holiday & Social Program Highlights

- Nearly 140 people attended our 2nd Night Seder.
- Over 160 people attended our Chanukah Shabbat Dinner and Service.
- Our monthly KIDdish Club continues to be a fun and engaging way for families with young children to celebrate Shabbat, serving over 50 unique families in the South Hills this year!
- Our Barbie Purim Spiel was a hit, and adults enjoyed a blast from the past 90's themed party the next night.
- TERMS organized our annual Memorial Day Bagel Brunch and Labor Day Picnic with great success.

Social Action & Social Justice

- Team Sandwich celebrated its 3rd year of providing over 6,000 sandwiches (and pizza) to our food insecure neighbors.
- We expanded our aid to FreeStore15106 from only nonperishable food items to clothing, Thanksgiving meal kits, and books.
- We continue to collect food for SHIM and FreeStore15106 on an ongoing basis.
- We supported local Veterans with food and clothing drives.
- Our members donated vitally needed blood during our Blood Drive. Our next drive is scheduled for this upcoming August.
- Our members engaged in volunteer opportunities with Veteran's Place, the Mt. Lebanon Nature Conservancy, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and the Turkish Cultural Center, as well as within our own grounds for gardening and cleaning volunteer opportunities.
- Our 3rd Annual SHIM 5K raised over \$1000, and shirt sales raised \$640 for 412Thrive.

Community Partnerships

- Temple Emanuel partnered with St. Paul's Episcopal Church and the Turkish Cultural Center to co-host an interfaith dinner and discussion series called Abraham's Table, strengthening those interfaith partnerships.
- We participated in a nationwide ADL program called Kulanu: Synagogues in Action Against Antisemitism.
- We worked with VolunTOTs and Uptown Speech Therapy to assemble over 200 Thanksgiving meal kits for families facing food insecurity in the South Hills.
- We hosted an interfaith community seder in collaboration with 2 for Seder.
- The Mt. Lebanon Library Garden Tour visited our SHIM garden.
- We sponsored and participated in Mt. Lebanon's Earth Day, Juneteeth, and Pride celebrations.
- We hosted an interfaith Pride Shabbat.
- We co-organized community-wide Chanukah and Purim celebrations with the JCC, PJ Library, and Beth El.

Facilities & Security

- We renovated the upstairs lobby into a welcoming and updated space.
- Our new interior and exterior security camera system was installed.
- Staff received advanced situational awareness training.


