A MESSAGE FROM RABBI AARON MEYER

"It is a tree of life to those that hold fast to it and all of its supporters are happy" we read in Proverbs 3:18 and we sing during our Shabbat morning service as we return to Torah to the aron hakodesh. Torah, our source of inherited wisdom and transmitted values, is often referred to using the imagery of trees, as are our hopes for the future: knowledge in the Garden of Eden is represented by a tree (<u>Genesis 2:9</u>); on Shabbat we sing our hopes that the righteous will flourish like the cedars in Lebanon (<u>Psalm 92:13</u>); our relationship with God and perhaps our lovers is represented by trees in the <u>Song of Songs (2:3</u>); and more.

It's small wonder that we have seen the "birthday of the trees" as cause for celebration…and innovation. At its origins, recognizing the age of trees appears to have been more about taxation than celebration as it dictated the rituals for bringing first fruits to the Temple (<u>Mishnah Rosh Hashanah 1:1</u>). The kabbalists in northern Israel, led by Isaac Luria, added mystical and symbolic significance to this date as they began to eat dates (and pomegranates and figs and carobs and 15 types of tree fruits from the land of Israel), thereby transforming an antiquated observance into a modern ritual. The early Zionists continued to draw attention to this renewed holy day, borne of their desire to reconnect the Jewish people to the land, embrace agriculture, and add forests through the Jewish National Fund/<u>Keren Kayemet LeIsrael</u>. And we, today, continue to add new meanings.

Rabbi Arthur Green, professor emeritus at Brandeis and founder of Hebrew College, writes in Torah of the Earth: Exploring 4,000 Years of Ecology in Jewish Thought, "As we seek to articulate a Judaism appropriate to a new era of Jewish history, we cannot fail to note that this period begins in the same decades when the human race realizes it has achieved the gruesome possibility of destroying the planet on which we all live." Dr. Green and the Jewish environmental movement see in Tu B'shevat a kind of Jewish Earth Day: a chance to honor our relationship with the natural world while thinking more carefully about our obligations to till and tend it for future generations.

While we can see in this holiday an evolution of Jewish practice, we also see a continued embrace of Jewish values as old as our tradition itself. "When the Holy One, blessed be God, created Adam the first man, God took him and showed him all the trees in the Garden of Eden. God said to him: 'See My creations, how beautiful and exemplary they are. Everything I created, I created for you. Make certain that you do not ruin and destroy My world, for there will be no one to mend it after you," we read in <u>Ecclesiastes Rabbah 7:13</u>. We have an obligation to safeguard this world, which we celebrate on Tu B'shevat and actualize every day of the year when we make values-aligned choices.

You have likely seen that the Temple community is making such a choice as we install a new roof and solar panels on our physical facility. This project addresses a critical need for Temple – replacing our aging, actively-leaking roof – while living our Jewish values in a way that will:

 Generate 249,356 kWh of electricity the equivalent of 25 average family homes in its first year of operation;
 - Offset 87% of Temple's annual energy consumption;
 - Save Temple \$1.4 million dollars over the 30-year warrantied lifetime of the panels.

This project is a significant financial lift for our community and we continue to solicit philanthropic contributions from those whose heart so moves them. <u>Click here to learn more and to support this effort.</u>

While we have made the conscious choice not to begin this work in February on Tu B'shevat but in summer of 2025, we hope this realization of our Jewish environmental values will be ready for the High Holy Days. We will continue to update you with the status of the project and what you might expect as we begin the installation process. Thank you to the many people who have already contributed to this effort and to those who might be considering a gift now!

Celebrating Tu B'shevat and Living Our Jewish Values Kate Louik, ECDC Director

Later this winter, Tu B'shevat will be celebrated throughout our classrooms at ECDC. While it may not garner the attention of a high holiday or even Chanukah, Tu B'shevat is one of my favorite days on the Jewish calendar to explore with children. Tu B'shevat, the Jewish "New Year for Trees," is a wonderful opportunity for preschoolers to connect with nature and Jewish traditions. In a Jewish preschool setting, this holiday is often celebrated by engaging children in hands-on activities that celebrate the beauty and importance of trees and the environment.

I invite you to celebrate Tu B'shevat in your own home this winter! You might work with your child to plant seeds in small pots indoors, symbolizing new growth and the nurturing of the environment. Reflect on how trees provide food, shelter, and oxygen, and think together about how you might work collaboratively to care for their new plants, teaching them responsibility and care for living things.

Another fun (and delicious!) way to celebrate is with a "fruit seder," during which children taste a variety of fruits, particularly those associated with Israel. Common fruits include figs, dates, olives, and pomegranates, each with its own significance in Jewish tradition.

During Tu B'shevat, I reflect on the story of Choni from the Talmud. From ReformJudaism.com:

"[Choni] was walking along a road when he saw a man planting a carob tree. Choni asked, "How long will it take for this tree to bear fruit?" "Seventy years," the man replied. Choni then asked, "Are you so healthy that you expect to live that length of time and eat its fruit?" The man answered, "I found a fruitful world because my ancestors planted it for me. Likewise, I am planting for my children."

How can we work together in this new year to make the world a better place for our children and our children's children? I look forward to doing this work of tikkun olam alongside our Temple Emanuel community.


